#### Report on Rural Exposure Camp -2019-20

Date: 16/12/2019- 19/12/2019

Location: Yellodu, Gudibande Taluk, Chikkaballapur District

Number of Volunteers: 79

**Theme:** Sustainable Development

**Objectives:** 

To execute and spread United Nation Sustainable Development Goals among students.

To help the students to explore the world of the rural environment.

• To develop Interpersonal Skills.

• To inculcate the sense of social responsibility towards the rural society.

#### Day 1 (16/12/2019)

Centre for Social Activities conducted a rural exposure camp from 16/12/2019 to 19/12/2019 in Yellodu, Gudibande Taluk, Chikkaballapur District with a focus on the theme of Sustainable Development. A team of 79 CSA volunteers accompanied faculty coordinators executed all the activities planned effectively. The camp started with life skill training for the high school students of Yellodu Government School. 60 high school students benefited from the training. The camp was inaugurated by Sri. R.T Venugopala Reddy, Headmaster Yellodu Government High School. The inauguration function was attended by the local Panchayat leaders and faculty members of Kristu Jayanti College. The inauguration was followed by a rally on Cleanliness Awareness Programme and a socio-economic survey of the village was conducted by the CSA volunteers. Volunteers visited more than 70 houses for data collection which equipped the volunteers about the various aspects of data collection and analysis. The first day came to an end with a review session about the programmes of the first day.

#### Day 2 (17/12/2019)

The second day of the camp began with a morning walk with the intention of starting the day with a healthy activity. After the morning walk CSA volunteers engaged in shramdan in the premises where they were residing. This was followed by the volunteers providing life skills training to secondary school students. Around midday, the literary competitions were conducted for the primary and secondary school students, which involved competitions such as pick and speak, pictionary and quizzes. A total of 50 students participated in these competitions. In the evening, sports competitions were held wherein several students from the school actively participated in various sports competitions such as kabbadi, running race, frog jump, three-legged races, volleyball and throwball. By evening, Prof. Muniraju Faculty Self-employment Training Center, Canara Bank,

Chikkaballapura addressed the gathering and provided explanation on the self-employment opportunities. The review session allowed students to express their experience of organising the various competitions.

#### Day 3 (18/12/2019)

The third day started with trekking to Sri Adhi Narayana Swamy Temple and after trekking the volunteers undertook the shramdaan for extending their service for the betterment of society/village. This involved students who were walking to a nearby village and simultaneously cleaning it by weeding out the plastics. This was followed by the completion of some of the remaining sports competitions for the school students. An awareness programme on Safe and Unsafe Touch was organized in the high school by the CSA volunteers. For the villagers a Dental camp was conducted with the help of Krishnadevaraya Dental College. Sri Hanumantharayappa, Thashildar, Gudi Bande Talik Chikkaballapura District visited the primary school and addressed all the CSA volunteers. By evening Dr. Naveen Kumar, Head, Department of Agricultural Chemistry, UAS Bangalore, interacted with the farmers of Yellodu and provided information regarding soil testing and water testing. After the programme, CSA volunteers entertained the people of the village with cultural activities. Prize distribution ceremony was held and the winners and runners up of the various competitions that had been previously held were awarded. There was a campfire in the evening during which the CSA volunteers gathered and discussed the events of the day and the things they learned.

#### Day 4 (19/12/2019)

The last day of the camp started with exercise for CSA volunteers. This was followed by a feedback session where the volunteers expressed their joy and satisfaction for being given the opportunity of being part of the rural camp that broadened their horizons and enlighten them about the life in rural areas. Many stated that they would never take what they were being provided by their parents for granted. Last day also students are engaged themselves in the Shramadhan. Valedictory function was held in Govt. High school. Sri R T Venygopala Reddy, Headmaster Government High School and other teachers of the school were present. The students returned to college by 3 p.m.

The highly productive rural camp was brought to a successful completion and fulfilled its theme of sustainable development. The volunteers got ample opportunity to understand the real life struggles of economically disempowered people living in rural areas and helped to inculcate and bring to light some of the skills that the local people possessed that could help them raise their living standards and lift them out of poverty which was one of the main purposes of the rural camp to begin with.





Date: September 2019- January 2020

Number of Beneficiaries: Students in Sri Sidhartha Srinivasa Higher Primary School,

#### **Objectives:**

• To extend the resources of CSA to the society.

• To identify the educational needs of the nearby schools.

• To provide educational facilities for the holistic development of children in nearby schools.

#### Brief write-up of the Programme:

Vikas Kendra, an initiative of Centre for Social Activities under Jayantian Extension Service intends to impart skill enhancement training to the needy students in select schools near the vicinity of Kristu Jayanti College. The schedule for the classes was from 2:00-3:30 p.m. Spoken English, Computer Literacy, Basic Mathematics, Science, Science Modelling, Technical Education, Cultural Activities, Sports, Art and Craft were given importance in Vikas Kendra.

35 volunteers have been selected for the Vikas Kendra programme after screening tests. The selected volunteers have undergone an orientation and various training sessions. Without disturbing the regular college hours, volunteers visited the assigned schools and engaged classes. The impact of the programme is visible from the request from schools to continue the programme in the coming semesters also.

#### **Brief write-up of the Programme:**

Kristu Jayanti College (INDIA) a member institution of the United Nations Academic Impact (UNAI) that has been chosen as the SDG Hub for Sustainable Development Goal 1: End poverty in all its forms everywhere has come up with another venture to enlighten the community through education. Centre for Social Activities of Kristu Jayanti College has started an evening study centre as part of the new initiative of CSA named Community Education Programme. With the aim to eradicate illiteracy among the migrant floating construction workers in Kothanur and empowering them to secure a better place in society, CSA volunteers after their regular working college hours provides supplementary education to children from grade 1-8 in two clusters.

The volunteers through a survey conducted among the community of migrant floating construction workers have identified the needy children and formed two clusters for providing them basic education. Most of the parents are illiterate and incapable of helping the children in their studies that affects the children's performance in school and let down their self-esteem which eventually leads to discontinuation of studies.

The programme has a framework of three months duration from December 2019- February 2020 with four slots. Each slot which involves 30 trained volunteers are handling classes. They are helping out the children to do their homework, revise the school lesson and in addition to that activities are conducted for the holistic development of children.



#### **Brief Write-up on the Programme:**

Centre for Social Activities in collaboration with CSA alumni members become a pathfinder in the face of COVID-19 pandemic threat by reaching out to the society. Under the able guidance of Prof. Manjunath S, alumni members had conducted a research on the impact of Covid 19 in the life of daily wage workers around 6k.m. of Kristu Jayanti College. #### **Objectives:**

- ✓ An alternative eco-friendly approach for sustainable agricultural practices through frequent use of organic and microbial biofertilizers.
- ✓ To reclamate and improve the fertility of the soil and crop productivity.

#### Report on the Programme:

Biofertilizers are substance that contains microorganism's living or latent cells. Biofertilizers increase the nutrients of host plants when applied to their seeds, plant surface or soil by colonizing the rhizosphere of the plant. Biofertilizers are more cost-effective as compared to chemical fertilizers. The microorganisms in biofertilizers restore the soil's natural nutrient cycle and build soil organic matter. One of the major advantages of such fertilizer is that it does not harm the environment or in other words it's environment-friendly.

Hence the present trial was practiced to evaluate the efficacy of biofertilizer consortium developed in the Biotechnology Research Laboratory of Kristu Jayanti College and tested in field provided by Alamba charitable trust, Gubbicross, Bangalore Rural district of Karnataka;

#### The Context:

Vegetative parameters of cultivated crops were observed healthy with minimal pests attack. Planted crops started yielding. Harvesting was done thrice.

#### The Practice:

Beneficial microorganisms such as *Rhizobium sp.*, was isolated from the root nodules of legumes; *Azotobacter sp.*, and phoshosphobacteria were isolated from the soil respectively. They were mass produced, mixed in right proportions and then injected into carrier material (peat) to prepare biofertilizer consortium. Similarly, vermicompost harvesred from college canteen wastes also added as a root study.

#### Crops tested:

- 1. Tomato
- 2. Brinjal
- 3. Chilli
- 4. Spinach

# **Evidence of Success:**

Since two years, the field has been in our lab to land practice, the fertility of the field (soil) was observed very good and become highly productive. Soil fertility, water porosity, nature, color and aeration of the field were observed very good.

#### **Brief Write-up of the Programme:**

Prof. Nandini enlightened on how Bangalore, once known as Garden City has changed over the years and stressed on the necessity to have sustainable development. She explained about how lakes play a major role in our lives and that we have a moral responsibility to protect and preserve them. She showed the photographs of different lakes in Bangalore and explained how they have changed due to human encroachment. When we pollute nature it comes back to us. She took a case study of Vrishabhavathi River and Bellandur Lake and explained how pollution has drastically changed the water quality. Water pollution in turn affects fishes and causes water-borne diseases as we consume them. Heavy metal accumulation has been witnessed near construction areas and there has been a case of cross-contamination of sewage leading to diseases in lake view apartments where lake encroachment has been done.


India is one of the 12 mega biodiversities of the world. Dr. Nandini elaborated on how her group has made an eco-friendly herbal hand sanitizer using native plants like turmeric and neem. It is important to grow native trees like Pongamia Pinnata (Pongam), Tamarindus Indica (Tamarind), Azadirachta indica Neem Tree) and Heritage trees like Banyan tree, Coconut Trees, Jack Fruit Trees, Rain Trees,

Peepal Trees. There are many number of aquatic species which could purify heavy metals in water. Growing typha plant around water bodies help in bioremediation. There many varieties of bacteria which aid in Bioremediation and Phyto-remediation. Phytoplankton Chlorella Vulgaris and Zoo plankton, Benthos have a great role to play. Insects too have a major role in maintaining the ecosystem. Odonates, butterflies, fishes, frogs, reptiles and birds are part of the natural biodiversity and have specific roles to play in the balance of the ecosystem. Dr. Nandini concluded the session by saying that if biodiversity is conserved automatically, water bodies will be purified. If we protect nature, it will protect you back.






#### Brief Write-up on the programme:

**Question:** How is the toxic waste from this hospital disposed? What are the methods used?




#### Brief Write-up on the programme:





the adolescent girls.


#### Brief write up on the programme:


Adolescent girls, 10 - 19 years aged constitute to one sixth of the world's population. In India, National Youth Policy defines adolescents as 13 - 19 years. Few studies reveal that the prevalence of thinness was 14% for younger girls and 6% for older girls. 60% of girls in the age group of 15 - 19 are found to have anaemia. Health of the adolescent is very important which will have adverse effect on maternal mortality ratio and crude birth rate.

The NSS volunteers from three groups joined together for the screening camp activity which took place in Purushanahalli village. The volunteers along with three faculty co-ordinators, Dr Rubavel Manohar, Dr Margret Mary and Mrs. Soumya S departed to the village by 08:40 a.m. First, the volunteers were taken to Shri Siddaganga Government High School, Purushanahalli Doddaballapura Taluk, Bangalore Rural District. The headmaster of the school granted permission to conduct the camp. The NSS volunteers approached the adolescent girls present at the school for a training session on values of healthy eating habits and nutritional values of foods and the right intake of required meal su right time. And interactive activities were conducted so the adolescences feel comfortable and active during the training session. The training session on nutritional foods was also conducted to the adolescent age grouped boys at the school. Later the BMI ratio of each adolescent girl were found by

taking the height and weight of each person. The results were recorded on a register for future assessment and analysis plans. Post lunch the volunteers went to each house in Purushanahalli to give the villagers awareness on present health issues and the measures that needs to be tackled with health problems that may arise due to certain conditions in context to different age group of people. The volunteers reached back to Kristu Jayanti college by 04:30 p.m.




To achieve the objectives of the hygienic awareness plan and organic farming the team of Kristu Jayanti College NSS & UBA will be following the below steps:


➤ Doing a survey and rally on hygienic awareness and organic farming. A rally was organized where we had communicated with the people in the village.

- As per the information that has been collected, there is no proper medical attention in the respective. If so, there is an emergency people should travel at least 1km.
- A lot of villagers have a lack of knowledge relating to sanitary issues.
- > The main point of view of this activity is giving and providing a proper knowledge about hygienic issues.
- > The profession that Ambalagere residence are most relating to catering. So Kristu Jayanti Students wanted to help them to provide cleanliness.
- > On 27<sup>th</sup> Jan all the NSS volunteers left their regular activity in college and started a new journey towards contributing to society.
- > As mentioned before Ambalagere Village was the place where we conducted our activity.
- ➤ For a more reliable solution we had prepare a questioner regarding hygiene and organic farming.
- There are minimum 150-175 houses. We were able to collect 70-80 reponses.
- ➤ After collecting the response, it was clearly seen that 90% of houses have their own toilet.
- And those toilets were also maintained properly.
- > But one thing that was clearly seen is, government has not helped any of the respective villagers for constructing the toilet.
- > All the toilet was self-funded.
- > The village condition in term of self-hygiene is good but outside i.e. village surrounding is not good. The sewage system is very bad. The only drawback is this.






## A Survey related to Health and Hygiene

Date: 29/01/2020

Theme: Health and Hygiene

#### Objective of the programme:

- To demonstrate skills, knowledge and behavior enabling children to grow up in caring homes and communities, including schools that are free from violence, abuse and exploitation.
- To educate the women about the menstrual hygiene
- To create awareness about the health hazards associated with the use of tobacco.

#### Brief Write-up on the Programme:

The practice of open defecation, poor personal health and hygiene practices and lack of proper treatment of solid and liquid wastes has a detrimental impact on public health, child mortality, gender equity, environment and economy in rural areas of the state. It is estimated that that 88% of the total disease burden in rural areas is due to a lack of clean water, poor health and hygiene practices, improper solid and liquid waste management. While reviewing the statistics pertaining to these issues, the following facts were identified.

The findings of the second round of the Global Adult Tobacco Survey 2016-17 for Karnataka revealed that 22.8% of adults in Karnataka about (1.2 crores) which means nearly one in three men and one in ten women, are currently using tobacco in some form. There should be a need to educate and make them aware about the environmental pollution and health hazards associated with the use of tobacco.

Menstruation and menstrual practices still face many social, cultural, and religious restrictions which are a big barrier in the path of menstrual hygiene management. In many parts of the country especially in rural areas girls are not prepared and aware about menstruation so they face many difficulties and challenges at home, schools, and work places. Inaccurate or incomplete knowledge and menstruation is a great hindrance in the path of personal and menstrual hygiene management. So carriers should be created to emphasize the use of reusable sanitary products or the natural

sanitary products made from materials like banana fibre, bamboo fibre, sea sponges, water hyacinth, and so on.

Crimes against children include physical and emotional abuse, neglect and exploitation, such as through child pornography or sex trafficking of minors. The children are vulnerable to different kinds of crimes like kidnapping, murder, rape or assault to the modesty of girl child, etc.

There comes the necessity for child and family social services, health and education and communities, schools to demonstrate skills, knowledge and behaviour enabling children to grow up in caring homes and communities, including schools that are free from violence, abuse and exploitation. The NSS unit of our college have taken an initiative of addressing these societal issues in Purushanahalli Village.

Our NSS student volunteers of three groups prepared posters and skit addressing these issues. Our student volunteers along with three faculty co-ordinators, Prof.Kalyani, Prof. Glady Agnes, Prof.Santhosh visited our UBA adopted village Purushanahalli, Doddaballapura Taluk, Bangalore Rural District in order to accomplish our task. The students were divided into three groups.

One group visited Hiriya Prathamika Patashale (government school) and addressed the children from 4 to 10 years age about the right touch. Out students narrated the children in detail about the following matters


- About the good touch and bad touch
- Ways to encounter it
- Skit relating to this
- Exhibited posters for better results.

Second group of students visited all women in that village and enquired about their menstrual hygiene. A survey was conducted and about 70 respondents were covered. Generally pointing out that about 40 % of the respondents use sanitary pads and about 60% of the women use clothes. It was also found that they lack in this hygiene. Its finally suggested that a medical camp or some awareness campaigns addressing these issues are required in order to show a sustainable development.


Third group of students carrying posters visited each house with an objective of enlighten the members of the village about the ill effects of using tobacco. Our students covered about 40 houses. But we were surprised to know that about 99.9 % of the people in the village don't consume tobacco.

In short, about three activities were carried out, of which two turned to be a great success.

Interestingly, almost 60 per cent of the total plastic waste generated in India gets recycled while the remaining escapes into the environment. However, most of this plastic is down-cycled. At this juncture, India needs robust and stringent waste management tools to substantially improve the situation. Plastic Pollution is a huge environmental and health issues as it harms us in more than one way such as it clogs drains, causes visual pollution and proves fatal for stray animals.
- In this regard, NSS volunteers briefed the villagers about the plastic reuse and explained them about the harms that the nature will face if the plastic usage increases. One visited the primary schools and created an awareness among the school children and another group visited the households and gave more input on the segregation and reuse of plastic.



#### **Brief Write-up of the Programme:**



#### Brief write up of the Programme:


The online event was held on Zoom platform and the meeting was started at 10:15 am on Saturday, 26 September. The session was attended by Kristu Jayanti faculty and students. The event began with a silent prayer at 10:30 a.m. The welcome note was followed by the inaugural address by Rev. Fr. Emmanuel P.J., Director, Kristu Jayanti College of Law, Faculty, Director, Jayantian Extension Services & Jayantian Alumni Association. The resource person of the day Mr. Vasuki Iyengar was welcomed and introduced. The session began officially at 10:40 a.m.



Mr. Vasuki Iyengar explained the need to need to manage garbage and how it is related to soil health to human health. He demonstrated various useful practices that will help in reducing the impact we have on waste accumulation in our environment. He highlighted the need to refuse, reduce and reuse single-use plastic materials including disposable utensils, bags, containers etc. He explained the process of waste segregation which is widely practice in Bangalore and showed how the wet waste can be used in creating compost at home. He explained different composting methods including zero cost option and minimal cost option. He demonstrated garden composting methods and DIY composting. He highlighted the need to switch to using bio-enzymes as natural cleaners instead of chemical ones.

The session ended at 11:40 with the vote of thanks delivered by Dr. Sangeetha Menon, Asst. Prof. Dept. of Life Science and Ms. Priya Josson, Asst. Prof. Dept. of Life Science. The students were encouraged to take this activity up as a project or assignment which could be included as part of internal assessment.






The completion was very challenging as the activity had to be monitored through the four weeks taking care to nourish the young plants and periodically take pictures and record their growth pattern.



# Report of activities under UNAI Hub for Sustainability Development Goal 1-Poverty (2018-20)



#### 1. No-Poverty programmes in Indian villages

6 February 2019 - Kristu Jayanti College (India), a member institution of the United Nations Academic Impact (UNAI) that has been chosen as the SDG Hub for Sustainable Development Goal 1: End poverty in all its forms everywhere, launched action-oriented programmes on campus and in neighboring villages, focusing on the theme Samruddha Vishwa (No Poverty).

Activities were carried out during the *Kristu Jayanti College National Social Service Annual Special Camp* at Doddamaralavadi village from 16 to 22 November 2018 with the intention of ending poverty, including: 1) English literacy programmes for the students in government schools and junior college 2) Computer literacy programmes in government schools and junior college 3) A rally in the neighbourhood villages of Doddamaralavadi that spreaded the message of *No Poverty* and promoted education.



Later in December, the *Rural exposure Camp* was organized by the Centre for Social Acvitities (CSA) in Purushanahalli village, Doddaballapura Taluk, under the theme of promoting education to eradicate poverty. Life Skills Training was conducted for 40 high school students of Siddaganga School in the village by CSA volunteers. The students expressed that they benefited from learning about the ten life skills during the training, namely self-awareness, empathy, critical thinking, creative thinking, decision making, problem solving, effective communication, interpersonal relationship, coping with stress, and coping with emotion.

A state-level consultation was also organized by the Department of Social Work on the UN Sustainable Development Goal 1: No Poverty, with the participation of Mr. Vetri Selvan John K, Program Manager, World Vision India, Bengaluru and Ms. Sashmeeta Mulmi, Director, Strategic Engagement, International Justice Mission, Bengaluru.

#### 2. Sensitizing the communities to end poverty

One year ago United Nations Academic Impact announced the inauguration of the UNAI SDG Hubs, UNAI member institutions selected as exemplars for their innovative scholarship and engagement related to the <u>Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs)</u> who serve as resources for best practices for the UNAI network, currently composed of over 1,400 universities and colleges <u>in more than 130 countries</u>.

On the anniversary of the program launch, we're taking this opportunity to check in with some of the hub schools to highlight their scholarship and activities over the past twelve months and look ahead to future initiatives. The first school profiled in our anniversary series is Kristu Jayanti College (India), UNAI hub for <u>SDG 1: No Poverty</u>.

One of the core values of Kristu Jayanti College is dignity. The institution believes that dignity of the human person is the foundation for empowerment and socio-economic transformation. Efforts are taken to uplift the dignity of socially disadvantaged, marginalized and underprivileged people through education and service. All academic activities strive to promote the dignity of the individual, gender sensitization, empowerment of women and social transformation.

The institution is working to end poverty in all forms by providing equity, access, and quality in higher education. The students are actively involved in various initiatives to ensure social protection for all susceptible groups which is critical to reduce poverty. Capacity building and diverse career opportunities help students build the confidence to contribute to the uplift of their families and communities and lead lives of service. The extension services of the institution create avenues of learning and understanding of modern world issues such as social exclusion, vulnerabilities, disasters, diseases and other phenomena which contribute to poverty and exclusion. Jayantian Extension services has organized 136 programs to address social issues and empower economically disadvantaged communities. The college was selected as one of the partnering institutes for the Unnat Bharat Abhiyan [UBA 2.0] program to help build the architecture of an inclusive India, and the institution was recognized for systematically fostering the culture of innovation among students and faculty members.

Some of the significant service learning programmes organized by the institution towards an inclusive, prosperous and sustainable society in 2019 include:

- Bhavishyajyothi, an education support program initiated for economically disadvantaged children in primary schools;
- The student volunteers organized a weeklong camp at Doddamaralavadi village with the theme *Eradication of Poverty and Promotion of World Prosperity*. Rural Exposure Camps were organized at Purushanahalli, Kesaragere, Malur, Byalahalli, Vaddarahalli, Ambalagere, Gullapura, Yelachagere, and Badrapura villages and provided life skills training, awareness raising about government poverty alleviation schemes, e-banking, environment friendly agricultural practices and career guidance to rural youth;

- Twenty-two health awareness and cleanliness campaigns were organized at seven villages
  of North Bangalore to help reduce the incidents of dengue, chikungunya and other
  infectious diseases;
- Essential supplies, generic medicine, reading materials, clothes and groceries were provided to 36 institutions assisting orphans, teens, persons with disabilities, the elderly, and those living with HIV in the community;
- Weekly English and computer literacy programs were conducted at four rural schools; and
- Students organized campaigns at 30 construction sites of North Bangalore to orient more than 300 construction workers on the importance of hygienic practices for their well-being.

The impact study conducted by the institution revealed an increase in enrollment, decline in the school dropout rates and improvement in academic progression among rural children. The awareness and orientation programmes conducted by the institution have shown improvement in youth strengthening family business, seeking gainful employment and taking up entrepreneurial ventures. The families have reported better yield due to the adoption of organic farming and are now able seek remedies from government agencies for any type of agricultural issues.

### Conscientious effort on the protection of the environment and sustainability

The institution believes in and promotes sustainable development that fulfills the needs of the present without compromising the ability of future generations to meet their needs. The institution molds environmentally literate, competent and dedicated global ambassadors of sustainability in all aspects of life. The institution offers 32 environment-related courses that nurture individuals who are committed to the conservation of the environment, and it encourages research on environment and sustainability concerns such as deforestation, pollution, diminishing natural resources, catastrophic climate change, species loss, vanishing water bodies, over-population and malnutrition. Twenty-six research articles were published in 2019.

India is a land with great demographic dividend. It is the duty of higher educational institutions to harness the potential of Indian Youth. Kristu Jayanti College, Bengaluru foresees a better tomorrow in collaborating with the United Nations' mission of creating future leaders ready to face the challenges of the contemporary world.

## 3. Initiative of Enlightening the Underprivileged Section

Transforming the Lives: Kristu Jayanti Student's Initiative of Enlightening the Underprivileged Section.

Kristu Jayanti College (Autonomous) (INDIA) a member institution of the United Nations Academic Impact (UNAI) that has been chosen as the SDG Hub for Sustainable Development Goal 1: End poverty in all its forms everywhere has come up with another venture to enlighten the community through education. Centre for Social Activities of Kristu Jayanti College (Autonomous) has started an evening study centre as part of the new initiative of CSA named Community Education Progarmme. With the aim to eradicate illiteracy among the migrant floating construction workers in Kothanur and empowering them to secure a better place in society, CSA volunteers after their regular working college hours provide supplementary education to children from grade 1-8 in two clusters.

The volunteers through a survey conducted among the community of migrant floating construction workers have identified the needy children and formed two clusters for providing them basic education. Most of the parents are illiterate and incapable of helping the children in their studies that affect the children's performance in school and let down their self-esteem which eventually leads to discontinuation of studies.

The programme has a framework of three months duration from December 2019- February 2020 with four slots. Each slot 30 trained volunteers are handling classes. They are helping out the children to do their homework, revise the school lesson and in addition to that activities are conducted for the holistic development of children.

The initiative has a great impact which helped to retain the children in school and the dropout rate has considerably reduced. Through this activity, CSA strives to uplift the underprivileged sections of the society by enlightening them through education and promoting self- confidence among the children.

The consultation discussed the Sustainable Development Goals, laid down by the United Nations to achieve a better and more sustainable future for all. Heads from various schools of social work, Senior faculty members, NGO Directors, Youth representing different communities and students from various colleges were present during the programme.

Mr. Vetri Selvan John K, Program Manager, World Vision India delivered the keynote address. He explicated about SDG-1, the features and significance of the Sustainable Development Goals of the United Nations. Ms Sashmeeta Mulmi, Director, Strategic Management International Justice Mission, briefed about the forces that led to the establishment of the Sustainable Development Goals and the need to address the problem of poverty at the earliest. Dr Jonas Richard A, Head, Department of Social Work elucidated the sustainable development goals of the UN and the significance behind celebrating the World Cities Day. He also highlighted the characteristics of the poor community, poverty cycle and its adverse effects.

Dr Victor Paul, Head, Department of Social Work, Christ University moderated an Open House discussion. The participants discussed pertinent issues like the ignorance of the public about relevant legislation, faulty urban planning, identity crisis, the lack of access to government services and traumatizing the poor. The discussion stressed the importance of the development of rural areas and the significant factors that propels poverty-related

The seminar commenced with an invocation by the department choir. Dr. Jonas Richard A, Head, Department of Social Work, welcomed the gathering. Dignitaries officially inaugurated the seminar by lighting the lamp.

Rev. Fr. Dr. Augustine George, Vice Principal, Kristu Jayanti College, in his inaugural address acknowledged the support of World Vision India and CARE. Fr Augustine also pointed out that it is the responsibility of the judiciary, government and the media to ensure the enforcement of human rights and appreciated the department's initiative in organizing the seminar.

Ms. Aiswarya Vimal, Student Representative, introduced the chief guest, Justice CG Hungund, Former Chairperson, Karnataka State, Human Rights Commission. Justice CG Hungund, in his inaugural address elucidated how human rights and associated acts evolved over centuries and attained a global dimension. He pointed out that Human Rights are a widely spoken agenda in most of the recent conferences and conventions thus highlighting the significance of the topic. He briefed the Basic Civic Amenities and Law

and Order classification of human rights violation cases. Justice also narrated human rights violation cases which he came across during his tenure. He highlighted that in this era of industrialization and modernization our society is lacking human culture.

A book on Indian Constitution was presented to the dignitaries. Dr. Rubavel M, Assistant Professor, Department of Social Work, delivered the vote of thanks. The formal session came to a closure with the college anthem

Technical session-I titled Promoting Human Rights and Sustainable Development Goals through Global Governance was handled by Ms. Sagaya Shanthy, Head-Women's Unit, Indian Social Institute(ISI), Bangalore She stated the facts and figures of people who had been forcibly displaced as result of persecution, conflict, violence and human right violations. According to her, one of the reasons for the sustainable development goals and the 2030 Agenda are a transformative development framework based on human rights. She pointed out the differences between sustainable development goals and human rights. She concluded the session by stating that inclusiveness is a vital factor in achieving the sustainable development goals.

Technical session-II on Building Resilience of the Poor through Social Protection was taken over by Mr. R. Manohar, Executive Director, Centre for Amenities, Rehabilitation and Education (CARE). He stressed on the seven things to know about managing climate risk through social protection. The session pointed out the importance of focusing on social protection for climate risk. According to him, climate shocks and natural hazards represent a significant part of the global humanitarian burden and hinder poverty eradication.

Technical session-III on Pathways to create Child Friendly Cities was handled by Mr. Vetriselvan John, Senior Manager, World Vision India). He detailed about the Child Friendly Cities Initiative (CFCI) 1996, strategies to adopt CFC and principles to be followed while building child friendly cities. The session was open for discussion and participants clarified their doubts.

Technical session-IV on Ensuring Accountability on SDG's on Women's Rights by Ms Sinimol P G, Advocate and Legal Consultant SRT Law Associates) focused on the constitutional rights to women and the reason behind the prevalence of violent crimes against women.

The session was winded up with National Anthem. Participants were awarded with the participation certificates. The seminar was well co-ordinated with the efforts of the faculties Dr. Winnie Joyce A., Dr. Rubavel R., Dr. Birudu Raju and Miss. Anurupa under the guidance of department head Dr. Jonas Richard A.

#### 6. National Colloquium on Ending Poverty: A Pathway to Social Justice

A National Colloquium on Ending Poverty: A Pathway to Social Justice was organized and conducted by the Department of Social Work, Kristu Jayanti College, in collaboration with World Vision India on 24th February, 2020. The colloquium commenced by an invocational hymn by the department choir, followed by, Dr Jonas Richard. A, Head, Department of Social Work welcoming the gathering. Dignitaries officially inaugurated the colloquium by lighting the lamp.

The Presidential address was given by Rev. Fr. Josekutty P D, Principal, Kristu Jayanti College. In his address, he spoke about the need of the hour is to close the inequality gap that exists worldwide but more so in a country like India. He also highlighted the importance to use education as a medium in empowering individuals to alienate poverty. Fr. Josekutty spoke about how essential it is to value human beings and ensure that they lead a dignified life and according to him this can be achieved only when we collectively join together to fight this war against poverty and bring about Social Justice for all.

Ms. Maria Jose, Student Representative, introduced the Chief Guest for the day, Mr Somashekhar A, BA. L, LLB (Member Secretary, District Legal Services Authority, Bengaluru, Urban District).

Mr Somashekhar A, in his inaugural address, spoke about the various articles that exist in the Indian Constitution such as Article, 14, 15 and 16 all of which aims at providing equality, equal opportunities for all through which eradication of poverty is possible. According to him, we already have the tools written within our constitution, our fundamental rights. He also stressed on Article, 14 (Right to Equality), Article 19, (Right to Freedom) and Article 21(Right to Life and Liberty), popularly known as the "golden triangle" of the Indian Constitution. From his professional and legal opinion, if individuals followed these articles, it is possible to alienate poverty to a large extent in the country which would ultimately result in Social Justice for all.

Technical session "Rural livelihoods: key Social Justice"  $\mathbf{A}$ This session was handled by Ms Uma Mahadevan, IAS (Principal Secretary, Panchayat Raj, Govt. of Karnataka). She spoke about how poverty is a multifaceted, intersectional issue that is not confined to the cliched norms that usually exist. Ms Uma also addressed the issue of protein hunger and how it is an embodiment of poverty. She mainly focused on the poverty-stricken lives of rural women, especially women who are pregnant and disabled. Her motto for the conference was to "Think globally, but act locally". According to her, policy interventions should meet the needs of not just one category but should be inclusive in nature and should help everyone. Social justice is setting right the deprivations. She also spoke about a lifestyle that is less about consuming and more about reusing, a lifestyle that is more sustainable and responsible in nature.

Technical session 2 - "Child Labour: Is it a right or a developmental issue?" This session was addressed by, Mr Lukose Vallatharai, IAS (Former Revenue Secretary). According to him, all children out of school are potential child labourers. He laid stress on how child labour creates a vicious cycle of low education, skill sets, a state of social seclusion, inequality and ultimately poverty and want. He also spoke about how India as a country is a generation producing half educated children, pre designed to serve higher class with cheap labour. Mr Lukose addressed as to how the poor are subsidising the rich through inadequate wages. He also spoke about various schemes and policies by the Government of India that ensures Social Justice. The session came to an end with a question and answer round.

**Technical** 3-"Poverty: Rights session A Human violation". This session was conducted by Ms Meera Sakseena IAS, (Former Chairperson, Karnataka State Human Rights Commission). Her deliberation was on, "Poverty: A Human Rights violation". Ms Meera spoke about the link that is evident and present between poverty and Human Rights. According to her, everybody is equal before the law. Nobody should penalise individuals based upon the sexual orientation, but rather make it a more inclusive and secure society. The importance of voicing out against atrocities were discussed in detail. True cases, stories were also shared with the audience. She also spoke about how the poor are the worst affected and take the brunt of all human rights violations that take place. The rich will get bailed out, etc, but the poor are made scapegoats. Ms Meera spoke in detail about the legal aid provisions that are available for the poor. The session came to a close with a detailed discussion with the audience.

Technical session 4- "Labour Rights Violations: A civilized society's response" This was taken over by Dr Manjunath G, KLS, PhD, (Additional Labour Commissioner, Director of Karnataka State Labour Institute, Government of Karnataka). He spoke about how labour rights should be considered as basic human rights. The minimum wages and the number of hours put in to work everyday was explained in detail. The various labour laws and especially labour laws in the field of HR was also discussed. The importance of labour codes was also touched upon. The session concluded with a question and answer round.

Next, on the agenda was the Survivor's Panel, wherein, Mr Rajendra Prabhakar, (Founding member, Eco Society India) moderated the Panel discussion. Individuals from poverty-stricken backgrounds, bonded labourers, house maids, construction workers, activists, shared their personal struggles and experiences in being under privileged and how Organizations such as World Vision have help them come up in life.

The National Colloquium came to an end with the National Anthem. This colloquium helped the participants in gaining expert opinion and guidance how to end poverty with the help of strategic goals. Participants that were present from various colleges were awarded with certificates. The Colloquium was well co-ordinated by the efforts of the Co convenors Dr. Winnie Joyce. A & Dr. Rubavel M, and the faculty members Dr. Birudu Raju & Ms. Anurupa.

He said that there was an inter-relationship between the sustainable development goals and the international covenant on economic, social, and cultural rights. Both of these were aimed at ensuring that people's economic rights were not violated. He concluded the lecture by stating the importance awareness on the first sustainable development goal, that is-no poverty and the strategies to achieve that goal. With that, the lecture same to an end. The vote of thanks was proposed by Ms. Deepika Annama Thomas, a student representative and a memento to appreciate the contribution made by the resource person was presented
