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International Lecture on Value Informed Social Work Practice

Social work is a profession dedicated to promoting social change and development, and empowering individuals, families, and communities to enhance their well-being. It involves interventions that support individuals facing personal, social, and environmental challenges, guiding them toward self-sufficiency and empowerment. Social workers are trained professionals who engage in a holistic approach to support clients and advocate for social justice. They undertake a variety of roles, such as providing direct services, facilitating community development, conducting assessments, advocating for policy changes, and supporting clients in overcoming challenges related to poverty, mental health, and domestic issues. In New Zealand, social workers perform a similar range of roles but within a unique cultural and legal framework.

To understand the practice of Value-informed Social Work, the Department of Social Work organised an International Lecture on the same, for the MSW students, belonging to Kristu Jayanti College Autonomous. The lecture provided students with a comprehensive understanding of social work in New Zealand, particularly its cultural dimensions and ethical frameworks. Students gained insight into the significance of biculturalism, the Treaty of Waitangi, and Māori values (the indigenous natives) in social work practice. They also explored the diverse fields of practice and international opportunities, enriching their knowledge of global social work contexts. Students found the lecture to be highly informative and relevant, especially in terms of integrating cultural values like biculturalism into social work practice and appreciated Dr. Glubb-Smith's engaging delivery and practical examples.

National Seminar on Technology in Social Work Practice
