He envisioned the sunrise of a renewed humanity through the integral development of the mind, body and spirit. The motto of the college, 'Light and Prosperity', aims at this synthesis and the harmony of the spiritual, the physical, the mind and the body. A healthy environment for the acquisition, promotion and dissemination of knowledge is provided with the aspirations of growing into an academic fraternity joining hands for the development and progress of humanity. The curricular and the co- curricular activities are the basic structures acting as springboards to step into the mystery of human life and beyond. The very name, Kristu Jayanti, as the college was established in Anno Domini 1999, is the commemoration of the two millennia of the birth of Jesus Christ, the Son of God, who invites each of us to dream and to reach the perfection of the Heavenly Father, God himself: "Be perfect, therefore, as your heavenly Father is perfect." The college is affiliated to Bengaluru North University and reaccredited with the highest grade 'A++' with CGPA of 3.78 out of 4 in the third cycle of Assessment and Accreditation by NAAC in 2021. The college is recognised by UGC under categories 2(f) & 12 B. The college was accorded autonomous status from 2013 by the UGC, Government of Karnataka & Bangalore University, Kristu Jayanti College was awarded the First Prize at National level for Clean and Smart Campus by AICTE & Government of India and New Code of Education Award for integration of Technology in Learning. In the NIRF 2022 and 2023 rankings, the college was placed among the top 150 colleges in the country and ranks as one of the five colleges from Karnataka. In the India Today - MDRA survey 2023, Kristu Jayanti College, Bengaluru is once again ranked as the Best Emerging College of the Century at National Level for Commerce, Science, Arts and MSW and the college is ranked 3rd Best in BCA, 12th Best in MSW, 21st Best in BBA & 22nd Best in Commerce, 20th Best in Arts, 28th Best in Science and 28th Best in Mass Communication among the Colleges in India. The College also ranked 2nd Best in MSW, 3rd best in Commerce, Arts & BCA, 4th Best in Science, 6th best in Mass Communication and 7th best in BBA among the colleges in Bengaluru.

I. Autonomous College

Kristu Jayanti College is reaccredited with the highest grade A++ with CGPA Score of 3.78 out of 4 in the 3rd cycle of Assessment and Accreditation by NAAC in 2021. The college was placed among the top 150 colleges in the country in the NIRF 2023 rankings.

Kristu Jayanti College, affiliated to Bengaluru North University, became an autonomous institution in the year 2013. The college designs the academic curriculum and adopts innovative teaching and evaluation methods. The University confers the degrees to the graduating students. The college believes in learner-centered teaching pedagogy and designs the curriculum to suit the national and international standards of education. All students are imparted with Life Skills Education in collaboration with Rajiv Gandhi Institute of Youth Development, Chennai. The pedagogy places great importance in providing additional support and mentoring students with learning differentials. At Kristu Jayanti College, students have the opportunity to involve in various co-curricular and extra- curricular activities. The Choice Based Credit System and the freedom to choose from a wide range of electives enable the students to pursue an expedition of limitless learning. Guided learning and continuous and comprehensive evaluation ensure and prompt students to study and learn punctiliously.

II. ACBSP Accreditation

The MBA programme of the School of Management (SoM), Kristu Jayanti College, is internationally accredited by the Accreditation Council for Business Schools and Programs (ACBSP), USA. The journey towards international accreditation with ACBSP commenced in the year 2016. Since then, SoM has been on a continuous expedition, exploring and evolving in the quest for quality in its academic endeavour. The indefatigable efforts of the management and staff over the past years have received the best results with the college achieving international accreditation for 10 years. The SoM has proved its mettle in all major standards and criteria of ACBSP.

III. United Nations Academic Impact Hub

United Nations Academic Impact (UNAI) announced the new SDG Hubs on 24 October 2018 for their innovative engagement related to the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs). Kristu Jayanti College is recognised as United Nations Academic Impact Hub for Sustainable Development Goal 1: 'End poverty in all its forms everywhere'. In the view of the initiatives taken by the college as a hub, the recognition has been extended to another term.

The educational philosophy of Kristu Jayanti College emphasises in the individual academic excellence and holistic development, fostering a deep concern for the society. This pedagogy focuses on moulding individuals into integrated personalities who are intellectually competent and socially sensitive. The college believes that quality education is a powerful weapon for ensuring a poverty free world. The institution instills a culture of community engagement and quality education to empower students with different religious and socio-economic backgrounds. Under the aegis of Jayantian Extension Services (JES), the college has undertaken various Social Outreach Programmes to provide students with exposure to marginalised groups, and entrust them with the task of promoting education and skills among the poor and the underprivileged.

IV. Unnat Bharat Abhiyan (UBA)

There are substantial developmental disparities between the rural and urban sectors, such as inequity in health, education, income, and basic amenities, as well as employment opportunities. These disparities have resulted in widespread discontent and large-scale migration to urban areas. The imperatives of the need for sustainable development are strictly observed worldwide. It also calls for ecofriendly development in rural areas and the creation of suitable local employment opportunities. Increasing urbanization is neither sustainable nor desirable. Kristu Jayanti College has partnered with the government through UBA scheme for rural development.

The prime motive of the UBA cell at the college is to connect with underprivileged rural clusters, actively participate in the planning process, and to promote the requisite science and technological interventions to improvise and expedite the developmental efforts. UBA cell is also responsible for developing the competence of its working group by appropriate orientation, training and creation of ethos within the institution that supports indigenous and sustainable rural development. It also initiates requisite curricular modifications and other facilitating measures.

V. DBT Star College Scheme

The Department of Life Sciences was sanctioned support under the strengthening component of the DBT Star College Scheme by the Department of Biotechnology, Ministry of Science & Technology, Government of India (Sanction No: BT/HRD/11/06/2020) during April 2020. The Scheme has been initiated by DBT to support colleges and universities offering undergraduate education to improve scientific skills of the students across the country. Through the scheme, DBT focuses on enhancing critical thinking and hands-on experimental work at the undergraduate level in sciences by partnering with colleges with ambition and potential for excellence. The scheme was implemented during the Academic year 2020-21. All students of B.Sc Biotechnology, Microbiology, Biochemistry, Genetics and Botany are a part of the skill training. The scheme has led to qualitative

improvements such as increase in number of hands on experiments in practical curricula, more student research projects, strengthening of laboratory infrastructure, introduction of a methodological training module (ITI).

VI. NPTEL Local Chapter

Kristu Jayanti College (Autonomous) was granted the privilege of being a Local Chapter for NPTEL (National Programme on Technology Enhanced Learning) on July 26, 2017. NPTEL is a project funded by the MHRD, Govt. of India,

The National Program on Technology Enhanced Learning (NPTEL)-A Project initiative of IIT Madras, supported by the Ministry of Human Resources Development, Government of India, offers an opportunity to undergo free online certification courses in Computer Science, Humanities, Basic Science streams and Management. This facility enables students and faculty to enrich their knowledge and obtain certifications for courses across domains.

THE CAMPUS

I. Infrastructure

The institution's infrastructure is aligned with the changing needs of the student population. To be on par with the scientific and technological advancements, parallel expansion of infrastructure in the form of laboratories, libraries and other learning resources such as computers, e-resources and Wi-Fi facilities are initiated. Physical facilities have been expanded to create an ambience conducive to academic excellence and holistic development. Various departments and administrative sections are housed in the Main Block, Humanities Block, PG Block and Administrative Block. The college has spacious classrooms, auditoria, laboratories, conference halls, panel rooms, and utility block.

Infrastructural facilities have gradually evolved to accommodate the growing student population. Adequate ICT and technological facilities enable effective transmission of knowledge. The auditoria, Chavara square and quadrangle serve as launch pads for diverse co-curricular activities. Various sports and games facilities contribute to the development of students in extracurricular activities. The dynamism of the students is evident in the optimal utilisation of these facilities. Adequate attention is given to provide necessary infrastructural facilities to the differently-abled. The infrastructure has been augmented to suit the growing needs of students and additional funds have been set aside for effective upkeep. The campus along with its facilities such as Libraries and laboratories are open to the students past the working hours as well, providing them with a rich and supportive space for learning. The students can avail the facilities of the campus on all days, from 8.15 a.m. to 9.00 p.m.

II. Library and Information Centres

The college library is housed in Main Block, PG Block and Administrative Block. The staff and students have access to a wealth of information in books, magazines, journals, encyclopedia, project reports, dissertations and annual reports in these three libraries. The library areas are automated and these enable easy accessibility and optimum usage through Electronic Public Access Catalogue (EPAC) facility. More than 69,720 books; over 3,200 CDs and DVDs; around 300 national and international journals, 13 newspapers and a vast collection of 48,850 electronic resources are available in the library. The e-database of the library consists of Delnet, EBSCO, Inflibnet, Capitaline, J-gate, Springer, ProQuest as well as institutional membership of National Digital Library (NDL) and British Library. The library utilizes Easylib 6.2, a web version as the automation software. Additionally, an annual book exhibition is organised to constantly upgrade the collection for the benefit of students and faculty members. Separate rooms for group discussion and the cubicles provide a calm ambience for learning.

III. Laboratories

Computer Labs

Computer labs housed in Main Block, PG Block, Humanities Block and Administrative Block are designed with state-of-the-art technology and the required application software for imparting quality education. They are equipped with internet and are kept open beyond office hours to meet students' computing needs. All the computers are networked, controlled by central servers and administered professionally. Computer lab provides IT facilities/services to augment academic ambience of the institution. The Internet lab is well-equipped with licensed software for academic and administrative needs. The students are also encouraged to use free and open source software. Research activities are carried out in the research lab in the PG block to provide technological solutions for the societal needs.

Life Science Laboratories

The Department of Life Sciences is equipped with eight teaching laboratories for conducting routine practical sessions for undergraduate and postgraduate students. Fully equipped and spacious laboratories for Biotechnology, Microbiology, Biochemistry, Genetics and Botany have all the facilities required to offer the best practical learning experience to the students. The infrastructure available in the teaching laboratories enable the students to execute experiments and research projects. The Department of Lifesciences also has a Research Centre in Biotechnology recognised by Bangalore University. The Research Facilities include Central Instrumentation facility, Animal Cell Culture, Plant cell culture facilities and Microbial culture collection centre. The laboratories are supported by the DBT STAR College Scheme, which provides academic and physical infrastructure for students in experimental science.

Forensic Science Laboratory

The Department of Forensic Science is equipped with five advanced laboratories which are well equipped to carry out relevant practicals in Forensic Science courses. With state-of-the-art instruments, the students are trained to analyse biological samples using contemporary methods and equipment. The lab is additionally equipped with Comparison Microscope, Digital Forensic MI scope, Anti-Static Dust Lifter, and Fourier Transform Infrared Spectroscopy (FTIR) for advanced Forensic Analysis.

Psychology Laboratories

The Department of Psychology is well-equipped with six ICT enabled labs that cater to empirical testing. Five Individual counselling units and two Group counselling labs, which replicates the actual experience of group counselling, enhancing and encouraging the students' understanding of the subject. It provides the students the ability to practice, develop and demonstrate their counselling skills and competencies required for the field. With the facilities in the

labs there is immense potential to generate various studies on attributes such as intelligence, aptitude, personality, memory, perception, neuropsychology and other behavioural dimensions. The use of different tests and batteries help students to extrapolate theory into practice and enables them to have a deeper understanding of varied psychological processes. The computer- based practical neuroscience assessments allow students to address the changing paradigms in the field of neuropsychological assessments. The Psychology lab is located in the fifth and sixth floor of the Humanities block

Electronics Laboratory

The field of Electronics is evolving rapidly. Keeping that in view, the department has spacious and well-equipped state-of-the-art laboratory facilities to carry out experiment in analogue electronics, digital electronics, advance communication, microprocessor and microcontroller. The lab is equipped with DC regulated power supplies, functional generators, microprocessor kits, microcontroller kits, advanced communication kits, VHDL kits, Verilog software and Matlab software. It is also equipped with an advanced analogue oscilloscope and digital storage oscilloscope to analyse and store the waveforms.

Physics Laboratory

The lab is equipped with sophisticated instruments to conduct practical sessions for undergraduate students. The lab is adequately equipped with advanced and digital instruments like Spectrometer, Cathode Ray Oscilloscope, Polarimeter, Conventional Travelling Microscope, semiconductor laser devices & Ballistic Galvanometer. The infrastructure available in the Physics lab enable the students to get hands-on training, collect and analyse data and provide them with output to carry out experiments and research.

Media Lab

The Media Lab at Kristu Jayanti College located in the Humanities block is equipped with state-of-the-art facilities to provide media studies students with hands-on experience using professional-grade equipment. The lab has multimedia workstations for video editing, animation, and graphic design. It also has a studio floor for film and television production, equipped with professional lighting rigs and the ability to use a green screen. Additionally, there is a preview room for reviewing and critiquing productions, a graphics lab specializing in 2D and 3D design, motion graphics, and visual effects, a dubbing unit with professional audio recording and mixing facilities, and a live production suite with cutting-edge tools for multi-camera live broadcasts. The department also houses a photography studio which is dedicated to supporting students in their creative and academic endeavors by providing access to professional photography equipment and space to practice and develop their skill set in the area. The Media Lab is designed to replicate the real-world production environments, preparing students for successful careers in the media industry. The lab has a studio floor to train students in interviewing, news reading, news discussions and anchoring skills. In addition to this, the lab is equipped with an audio-recording unit to produce voiceover content for television and radio programmes and an audio-video editing console with industry-standard software. To enable students to get practical exposure to live television programme production, the lab is equipped with a multi-cam live production facility. The students pursuing Media Studies programmes gain real-world experience in multi-media productions through the Kristu Jayanti College Television (offline television channel) and Kristu Jayanti Radio.

Language Lab

The Language Lab provides a platform for students to develop their listening, reading, speaking and writing skills (LSRW). The language sessions complement the thrust of the overall curriculum, which is designed to equip students with practical language skills. The language lab uses Orell Talk software, which contains lessons for beginner, average and advanced learners. The topics include language teaching and phonetics, which are difficult to explain without audio- visual apparatus. The students appreciate computer-enabled learning as it enhances their learning and understanding. The lab ensures that students acquire a neutral accent in English which would help them in their careers goals. The Language lab sessions help the students to develop their pronunciation and gain proficiency in language skills. The students learn the language through imitation drills, a core language learning method. The language lab also trains the students in acquiring functional language skills in Korean and India Languages, which include, Kannada and Hindi.

Business Lab

The lab offers Live Example Sessions which Integrates learning via live examples and offers specimens to provide students with real-world insights and experiences. From analyzing financial statements to understanding market trends, the students engage directly with industry-relevant scenarios. Importance is given to the development of Practical Skills whereby the students learn by actively engaging in sessions which includes practical exercises relating to filling out tax returns and simulating the process of opening bank accounts. These hands-on activities ensure that students have a clear understanding of concepts and also gain proficiency in the application of skills. Guidance provided by experienced faculty, industry experts and professionals with inter-active sessions designed to meet the demands of modern business challenges enable the students to strive forward in their area of interest. The Industry-Relevant Training focuses on equipping students with the set skills that employers value most, enhancing their career readiness upon graduation which helps to transition from campus to corporate. The Business lab is located in the third floor of the Main Block.

IV. Research Centres

Kristu Jayanti College is a launchpad to pursue scholarly knowledge through research. Its mission is to promote the research environment among students and

the teaching fraternity. The Centre is committed to organise best-in-category FDPs/workshops/seminars/conferences for budding researchers and industry professionals. The Research Promotion Cell with four wings under Biotechnology, Psychology, Management and Commerce motivates scholars toward the acquisition of a doctoral degree. With several ongoing projects, the research centres are dedicated to erudite leadership and aim to advance knowledge in the respective fields through scientific discovery, collaborative work, and national and global outreach. The research programme is affiliated to Bengaluru North University and the research centres are actively dedicated to the pursuit of excellence in the respective fields.

V. Kristu Jayanti Learning Management System - KJLMS

Learning Management System delivers an apt platform in the digital era to facilitate the teaching- learning process. The pedagogy design, instructional design and flipped classroom for course preparation is one of the best practices of the college. KJLMS is the customised version of the world's open- source learning platform. The students and faculty can access this platform from anywhere at any time using their specific login credentials. X. Kristu Jayanti Software Development Centre (KJSDC)

The health centre in collaboration with NSS, CSA and Women Empowerment Cell organises several events like awareness programmes on healthy practices, eye and dental camps, blood donation camps, diabetes screening camps, general health camps and awareness programmes on women's health. In addition to these measures, first aid amenities are available in every block of the college. The college has signed an MOU with Bangalore Baptist Hospital for medical support and care.

XV. Fitness Centre

Located on the 5th floor of the PG Block, the fitness centre is equipped with various fitness equipment like lat pull-down machine, Smith machine with multi exercise options, leg press, leg extension machine, spider row machine, cable crossover & bench press machines, preacher curls bench, cross trainer, treadmills, cycle spinner, battle rope, box plyometric, steppers, barbells, kettlebells, medicine ball, stabiliser ball, hypertension bench and declined abs bench. Students and staff can avail the facility with a paid membership. A full-time fitness trainer is available to guide the fitness regimes of the students and faculty.

XVI. Stationery and Reprography Centre

The reprography centre at the cafeteria in the basement of PG Block meets the customised needs of the students and staff. It also offers photocopying and printing facilities for students at a minimal cost. Textbooks, laboratory manuals, practical records, notebooks and leave forms are available at this venue. The centre is equipped to take care of a large scale of operations and thus ensures that the requirements are satisfied within the expected time.

XVII. Music Room

The music room is situated in the 8th floor of the Admin Block. Students are provided with various musical instruments like keyboards, acoustic, electric & bass guitars, drum kits and electronic drum pad. The room is used for vocal and instrumental training sessions by the College Choir and Kristu Jayanti Music Academy.

XVIII. Dance Training Studio

The Dance Training Studio is situated in the sixth floor of the Admin Block. The Dance Training Studio is a space for performers to learn and rehearse. The floor of the studio provides a degree of flexibility to absorb the impact of intensive dance exercises, such as jumping. One side of the wall is covered by floor-to-ceiling mirrors, which aid the performers in understanding their body position and alignment while practicing.

XIX. Creative Design Room

Located on the third floor of Main Block, the Creative Design Room caters to the in-house requirements of graphic designing, web designing, printing, photography. The creative content designing of in-house journals, handbook, calendar, magazines, publications, calendar, diary, posters, brochures, invitations, advertisements and certificates is spearheaded by an expert team. The team also

oversees the printing and issue of the Identity Card for the students, faculty members and staff.

XX. Recreational Spaces

State-of-the-art infrastructure amidst greenery is the hallmark of the college with varieties of trees, flourishing gardens, fountains, water harvesting facilities, and parks. Three green parks and leisure areas are set up that are replete with lush greenery and shady trees, ideal for students to relax and rejuvenate. In recognition for its concern for environment and sustainability, Kristu Jayanti College has received the Green Certification and the Gold Rating by AICTE, Govt. of India, and the Clean and Smart Campus Award.

Chavara Square is the amphitheatre of Kristu Jayanti College that provides an apt platform for open house events such as promotional activities, recitation and performances. The green gallery at the Chavara square is a place to relax in the lap of nature.

XXI. Cafeteria and Food Court

The college cafeterias are the pulse of the campus. These are spacious areas with a variety of hygienic food at an affordable price. It is a popular hub on the campus for refreshments, discussions and student bonding. The cafeteria is open from

8.00 a.m. to 6.00 p.m. Five vendors in the cafeteria of the PG Block and three in the Administrative Block with modern kitchens cater to the diverse student community with North Indian, South Indian and Chinese cuisines.

Food Court

The Food Court near the main gate offers quality food, snacks, fresh fruits, juices and a variety of delicacies through vendors. The food court serves as the venue for refreshments for guests during the conferences and academic fests.

Pantry Hall

The Pantry hall is located on the first floor of the Administrative Block. It caters exclusively for the faculty, guests of the college and administrative staff of the college for refreshments and buffet service for breakfast and lunch at a nominal price.

XXII. Parking

The college has allotted ample space in the basements of the Administrative Block and the Humanities Block for parking with pass and security restrictions. The Level I of the basement is exclusively for the two-wheelers and Level II for four-wheelers. Only vehicles displaying KJC vehicle pass will be permitted to park inside the campus.

XXIII. Utility Block

The utility room is a versatile and essential space created for the functional needs of the students, it houses facilities such as recreational spaces, dressing rooms for literary and cultural events and it also converts into a common meeting area for students.

XXIV. Student Centre

The student center is exclusively designed for the creative needs of the students. It provides a space for student lead meetings, discussions and talks. The space can also be made use for prop creation for the annual theatre production, literary fests and other events. Students can use the creative corner in the basement 1 of the humanities block.

XXV. Admission Office

The admission office is located in the ground floor of the Humanities Block. It guides and supports prospective students through the application and admission process. The office enables in the completion of student applications, understanding the admission requirements and meeting important deadlines.

XXIII. Student Accommodation

Boys and girls have exclusive hostels. The hostels for girls are managed by religious congregations of nuns. As an extended home away from their own homes, the hostels endeavour to facilitate the academic activities as well as the intellectual, physical and psychological growth and development of the students. Moreover, Jayantian code of conduct and decorum are extended to the hostels.

The academy encourages the students of the Department of Computer Science to discuss and update their knowledge through a series of programmes like expert lectures, tech-talk series, special interest group seminars, open badge digital certification courses, exhibitions, industrial visits, etc. The academy organises various programmes and fests that promote the exchange of ideas among the student community to foster their teamwork and leadership skills.

21. Economics Club

Economics Club is a forum for interaction on current social and economic issues among students. It provides avenues for co-curricular and extracurricular development activities for students pursuing a career in Economics. The club aims to update the students with present economic problems and discuss the current policy- related issues. The club organises workshops, guest lectures and expert talks on relevant topics. Activities like budget presentations, online surveys, paper presentations, field surveys, debates and an intracollegiate fest are organised by the club.

22. Tourism Club

The tourism club aims to make young minds aware of the prospects of the tourism sector. The club focuses on the overall development of the students through academic excellence. To inspire and expose students to diverse perspectives of the tourism industry, the club invites guest speakers to share their experiences and insights. The tourism club organizes guest lectures, expert talks, seminars, cultural exhibitions, field visits, and panel discussions, to equip the students to meet the industry requirements.

23. Professional Interface Forum (PIF)

The Professional Interface Forum is an exclusive forum that brings together the Industry Experts, Industry Executives and Professionals. The main objective of the forum is to provide an opportunity to the students to converse with the industry thought leaders who are seasoned experts in their respective business areas and help the student community to draw out the essence from the knowledge and expertise of the Industry Professionals. The Forum encourages discussion forums and networking with the industry experts to gain insights in the realm of Business and Finance. It enables the students to remain in touch with the industry players and draw inspiration from the leaders by interacting with them. The Professional share their success stories and also share tips for clearing the professional exams.

24. Investors Club

Investors Club endeavours to train all undergraduate students on the basics of stock market, investment opportunities and development skills. The core ideology of the club is to cultivate the interest of students in finance as an academic subject and also as a career option. The club activities cover a broad range of domains in finance like investment avenues, trading and settlement. The activities include conducting knowledge sessions, quiz, case analysis, career preparation session, mock trading and guest lectures. Experts from BSE, NSE, Mutual Funds, NCDEX and MCX are invited to train students and to create awareness regarding the stock market, commodity market and the functioning of stock trading in Indian exchanges.

25. Forensic Science Club

The Forensic Science Club aims to engage students academically through the efficient coordination of the department's competitive and joyous activities. Students are introduced to the scientific elements of forensic science through the club, and they also gain from and contribute to the extracurricular and cocurricular components of student life. The club encourages students to join in and compete in the many events and contests while also helping them develop their talents. This aids students in maintaining their expertise and keeping up with advancements in forensic science. A student-centered learning platform named 'Forensis' where students actively engage in curricular topics in a non-classroom environment is organized by the club every month. The club organizes 'Atrium'-an intra-collegiate UG fest, 'Inquisitor'- a national level inter-collegiate fest and 'Kryptos' - a forensic science exhibition.

26. Speculators' Club

The Department of Professional Accounting and Finance formed the Speculators' club in the year 2021 with the aim of providing a powerful knowledge bank on Basics of Stock Market functions and operations, Investment Opportunities and Stock Analysis. The club introduces to the process of how to find and analyze companies, determine the risk of a stock investment or trade, proper entry and exit time of the stock, understand why markets move the way they do, and help you choose the right trading style for the correct approach to financial planning. The club covers core activities including conducting knowledge sessions, quizzes, case analysis, career preparation session, mock trading and guest lectures by experts from BSE, NSE, and Mutual Funds to educate the students and to create awareness.

27. Film Club

The Film Club organises regular screenings of artistic cinema, documentaries and short films. This forum provides the students with an opportunity to watch, discuss

and review films. Moreover, it is a fantastic launch-pad for the student aspirants in the field, exposing them to liberal arts and critical thinking.

28. Physical Sciences Academy

The academy is an initiative of the newly formed Department of Physical Sciences. The academy aims to cultivate a dynamic learning environment where students can unlock their full potential and explore the captivating world of Physics, Electronics, Mathematics, Statistics and Computer Science. The Physical Sciences Academy endeavors to provide a platform that goes beyond conventional classroom learning. By organising competitions, exhibitions, expert lectures and skill development activities, the academy will foster an atmosphere of curiosity, discovery, and hands-on engagement, enabling students to develop a profound understanding of scientific principles and their practical applications.

29. Sociology Club

The newly founded Sociology club is a student run community, which allows for the active engagement and participation of the students in the various events of the department. The club organises multiple events that nurture and encourage the students' passion towards contemporary issues, society and its complexities and it enhances their critical thinking and communication skills. The events include Guest lectures, where the students are given the opportunity to interact with a diverse group of professors, researchers and professionals. Discussion Panels organized by the club enables the students to engage in thought-provoking conversations ranging from gender, sociological imagination and global issues. The club significantly contributes to the organistion of the department fest, 'Humantra' and also aid in the curation and publication of the department magazine, 'Unlocking Minds'. This multifaceted club propels young minds to discover and pave a path for themselves in the field of sociology through experiential learning.

STUDENT WELFARE AT KRISTU JAYANTI COLLEGE

I. Student Welfare Office

The Student Welfare Office functions on the ground floor of PG Block. The Office offers support for students helping them overcome the hindrances that may come in the path of their learning process. The Student Welfare Office complies with the policies set by the College in order to facilitate a positive academic environment and help students progress smoothly in their educational journey.

II. Kristu Jayanti Scholarship Scheme (KJSS)

The student community at Kristu Jayanti College belong to diverse backgrounds. In addition to the financial aid from central or state governments, the undergraduate students are eligible to apply for KJSS. This scheme is instituted by the college to motivate and encourage the students who are outstanding in academics, co- curricular and extracurricular activities and to help the students who are economically disadvantaged and differently abled. A scholarship committee scrutinises the applications based on the criteria and recommends the institution for the award of the scholarships during the even semester of the academic year. KJSS has four categories.

- a. Jayantian Achievement Scholarship (JAS) for the outstanding academic achievement of students
- b. Jayantian Talent Scholarship (JTS) for outstanding extracurricular achievements
- c. Jayantian Upliftment Scholarship (JUS) for those who are in need of financial assistance.
- d. Jayantian Determination Scholarship (JDS) for Divyangjan students.

III. Student Council

Students have a valuable contribution to make to the effectiveness of their institution. Their involvement in the activities of the college is itself a valuable part of the education process. The Student Council at Kristu Jayanti College is a representative structure through which students can become involved in the affairs of the college, working in partnership with the management and staff.

At Kristu Jayanti College, the members of the council are given an opportunity to take the lead in planning and organising major programmes. Through planning, structuring, and executing various academic, co-curricular and extracurricular activities of the college, the members of the Student Council are inducted into a sense of ownership of the institution. This sense of ownership is disseminated among the student community of the college.

The Student Council comprises of the President, a postgraduate student, Vice President, an undergraduate student and three secretaries representing the three deaneries. The student council members are nominated by the Teachers' Council.

IV. Counselling Centre

Kristu Jayanti College aims at chiselling the student into men and women who are mature, balanced, and responsible. The college provides the students with the services of professional counsellors. The Centre, with a full-time professional counsellor works towards nurturing the holistic development of all Jayantians. The counselling centre facilitates the development of remedial systems for students whose declining motivational factors may have kept them away from achieving their full potential. The objective of the centre is to provide counselling services in an accessible and student-focused environment, keeping in mind the unique needs of the student community.

Activities:

- Personal Counselling: Offered in an unconditional, non-judgmental, and confidential manner to students who walk in to seek help with personal or academic difficulties. Guidance is also provided to improve their academic performance by reviewing study techniques and time management practices. The centre also serves as a channel for student grievances. Parents are free to contact the counsellors regarding any concerns they may have about their wards.
- Psycho-Educative Sessions: The centre organises psycho-educative sessions
 for all the first-year undergraduate students in order to empower young adults
 with accurate information on various topics of concern, such as addictions,
 managing relationships, reproductive health and personal safety.

V. Anti-Ragging Committee

A conducive and amicable environment is a hallmark of Kristu Jayanti College. This ambience is ensured by various committees and bodies that make students aware of the consequences in the event of breaching the code of conduct. The antiragging committee is instituted to ensure the safety and comfort of the students and to provide an amicable environment in the campus and the hostels. The college is guided by the UGC Regulations on curbing the menace of ragging in Higher Educational Institutions. It is expected that every student of the institution reads the below mentioned Government Order and guidelines and abides by the regulations.

Ragging is a cognisable offence and those who indulge in it or encourage it will be handed over to the law as per G.O.Ed 122 URC 96 dated 16.1.97.

Meaning of and 'What' Constitutes as Ragging

Ragging constitutes any one or more of the following acts with or without intent to derive sadistic pleasure or establishing power, authority, or superiority by any student/s over any fresher or any other student.

a. Any disorderly conduct whether by words spoken or written or by an act which has the effect of teasing, treating, or handling with rudeness a fresher or a junior student.

- b. Indulging in undisciplined activities which causes or is likely to cause annoyance, hardship or psychological harm or to raise fear or apprehension thereof in a fresher or a junior student.
- c. Asking the students to do any act or perform something which such student will not do in the ordinary course and which has the effect of causing or generating a sense of shame or embarrassment so as to adversely affect the physique or psyche of a fresher or a junior student.
- d. Exploiting the services of a fresher or any other student by any student/s for completing one's own academic tasks.
- e. Any act of financial extortion or forceful financial burden put on a fresher or any other student.
- f. Any act of physical abuse including all variants of it such as sexual abuse, assault, stripping, forcing obscene/lewd acts, gestures, causing bodily harm or any other danger to health or person.
- g. Any act or abuse by spoken words, emails, posts, public insults including deriving perverted/sadistic/vicarious pleasure from actively or passively participating in the discomfiture meted out to any fresher or any other student.
- h. Any act that affects the mental health and self-confidence of a fresher or any other student.
- i. Any act of physical or mental abuse (including bullying or exclusion) targeted at another student (fresher or otherwise) on the ground of colour, race, religion, caste, ethnicity, gender (including transgender), sexual orientation, appearance, nationality, regional origins, linguistic identity, place of birth, place of residence or economic background.

Consequences of Ragging

- The institution is 'zero tolerant' to ragging. Any form of ragging will be strictly
 dealt with in Kristu Jayanti College, including the departments, constituent
 units, all its premises (academic, residential, sports, kiosks, cafeteria and the
 like) whether located within the campus or outside and in all means of
 transportation of students whether public or private.
- The Institution will take strict action against those found indulging in ragging, including but not limited to, cancellation of admission and/or criminal proceeding against those found guilty of ragging and/or of abetting ragging whether actively or passively or being part of a conspiracy to promote ragging.
- An offence of ragging may be charged either on a written complaint by the affected or on independent finding of the Anti-Ragging Committee.

Students in distress may call any of the numbers of the anti-ragging committee members displayed on the college notice board or the college website or email antiraggingcell@kristujayanti.com

Procedure to Register the Complaint by the Aggrieved

- a. Any student affected by or subjected to ragging must lodge a written complaint in person or by email (from his/her college mail id) to The Chairman, Anti-Ragging Committee within three working days of the incident duly citing the date, time and place of the incident, name and details of the student/s involved and the nature/act of ragging.
- b. Where the aggrieved is not able to present the complaint in person for any justifiable reason, it may be lodged by the parent/guardian.

VI. Committee for Prevention of Sexual Harassment (POSH)

The Committee for Prevention of Sexual Harassment at Kristu Jayanti College, aims to ensure a safe environment and congenial atmosphere for the holistic growth of girl students and staff of the college.

Understanding Sexual Violence and Sexual Assault.

For this purpose, sexual harassment includes unwelcome sexually determined behaviour (whether directly or by implication) such as:

- Verbal or physical threats
- Insulting, abusive, embarrassing, or patronizing behaviour or comments
- Offensive gestures, language, rumours, gossip, or jokes
- Humiliating, intimidating, demeaning and/or persistent criticism, open hostility
- Suggestive comments or body language
- Isolation or exclusion from normal work or study place
- Publishing, circulating, or displaying pornographic, racist, sexually suggestive, or otherwise offensive pictures or other materials
- Unwanted physical contact, ranging from an invasion of personal space to a serious assault (the above list is not intended to be exhaustive)

The following is also sexual harassment and is covered by the committee:

- Eve-teasing
- Unsavoury remarks
- Jokes causing or likely to cause awkwardness or embarrassment
- Innuendos and taunts
- Gender-based insults or sexist remarks
- Unwelcome sexual overtone in any manner such as over the telephone (obnoxious telephone calls) and the like
- Touching or brushing against any part of the body and the like
- Displaying pornographic or other offensive or derogatory pictures, cartoons, pamphlets, or sayings
- Forcible physical touch or molestation
- Physical confinement against one's will and any other act likely to violate one's privacy

In case of such an event, a written complaint (in a prescribed complaint form) within three working days of the incident must be submitted to the committee. The Committee for prevention of sexual harassment assures all the complaints of the students, teaching and non-teaching staff are treated with dignity and respect, and confidentiality will be maintained after the complaint is registered.

VII. Grievance Redressal Cell (GRC)

The Grievance Redressal Cell aims to provide a mechanism to students of the college to air out their grievances and to provide redressal for the same so that they have smooth tenure at the college from the day of admission to their graduation. As part of our constant endeavour to ensure transparency in all the activities at different stages, the college has devised a proper mechanism for redressal of student grievances. The members of the cell deal with the grievances, which may be related to the common problems at the institute level, both academic and administrative. The aggrieved member shall submit the duly filled complaint form to any member of the Grievance Redressal Cell in a sealed envelope. On receipt of a petition, the Grievance Redressal Cell will endeavour to send its recommendation to the Principal for further action. In case of false and frivolous complaints (if proved), the Grievance Redressal Cell will recommend Principal/ Disciplinary Authority to take appropriate action against the complainant. Complaints dropped in the 'Suggestion Box' by students and parents, and oral complaints will also be redressed. The Student Grievance Redressal Cell assures that all the complaints are treated with dignity and respect, and confidentiality will be maintained. CENTRES

ASSESSMENT REGULATIONS (UG 2022-25, UG 2023-26 & UG 2024-27 and PG 2023-25, 2024-26

Criteria for Promotion to the next Semester/Trimester

- Students who are not having more than sixty percentage of attendance without considering medical leave shall not be eligible for promotion to the subsequent semester/trimester.
- Students who do not appear for End Semester/Trimester Examinations/SA of two consecutive semesters/trimesters cannot pursue the subsequent semester/trimester.
- Students who have not applied for End Semester/Trimester/SA Examinations
 by paying the due examination fee are not eligible to be promoted to the
 subsequent semester/trimester.

All UG and PG programmes follow a semester system where a semester has ninety working days.

The MBA programme follows a trimester system and has six trimesters. Each trimester will have 60-65 working days.

All courses are assigned credits. A 'credit' is generally a 'value' used to measure a student's workload in terms of learning time required to complete course units, resulting in learning outcomes. The total credits to be earned by a student for Graduation is given in the curriculum.

1. Definitions of Key Words:

- **Academic Year:** Two consecutive (one odd + one even) semesters constitute one academic year.
- **Generic Elective/Open Elective:** The Generic Elective is offered for PG programmes and Open Elective is offered for UG programmes. An elective course which is interdisciplinary and can be chosen from a pool of courses
- **Course:** Usually referred to, as 'papers' is a component of a programme. All courses need not carry the same weight. The courses should define learning objectives and learning outcomes. A course may be designed to be comprised of lectures/tutorials/laboratory work/field work/project work/vocational training/viva/ seminars/term papers / assignments / presentations/ self-study etc. or a combination of some of these.
- Credit Based Semester System (CBSS): Under the CBSS, the requirement for awarding a degree /diploma /certificate is prescribed in terms of the number of credits to be earned.
- Credit: A unit by which the course work is measured. It determines the number
 of hours of instructions required per week in a semester. One credit is
 equivalent to one hour of lecture/tutorial or two hours of practical work/field
 work per week in a semester. It will be generally equivalent to 13-15 hours of
 instructions in a semester.

- **Grade Point:** It is a numerical weight allotted to each letter grade on a 10-point scale.
- **Credit Point:** It is the product of grade point and the number of credits for a course
- **Letter Grade:** It is an index of the performance of students in a said course. Grades are denoted by the letters O, A+, A, B+, B, C, P and F.
- **Programme:** A programme leading to the award of a Degree, diploma or certificate. Denotes the title of the programme (e.g.: Bachelor of Arts, Bachelor of Science)
- **Semester:** Each semester will consist of over 16 weeks of academic work equivalent to 90 working days. The odd semester may be generally scheduled from June to December and even semester from January to May.
- **Semester Grade Point Average (SGPA):** It is a measure of performance of work done in a semester. It is the ratio of total credit points secured by a student in various courses registered in a semester and the total course credits taken during that semester. It shall be expressed up to two decimal places.
- Cumulative Grade Point Average (CGPA): It is a measure of the overall cumulative performance of a student over all the semesters of a programme which will be depicted in the consolidated markscard. It is calculated as follows CGPA = ∑(Si x Ti) / ∑Ti where Si denote the SGPA for the ith semester and Ti denote the Total Credits of the ith semester, (value of i ranges from 1 to 6).
- Transcript or Grade Card or Certificate or Marks Card: Based on the grades earned, a grade certificate shall be issued to all the registered students after every semester. The grade certificate will display the course details (code, title, number of credits, grade secured etc.).

- Discipline Specific Elective Project (DSEP)
- Discipline Specific Elective Internship (DSEI)
- Discipline Specific Elective Fieldwork (DSEF)

These elective courses are chosen generally from a range of courses specific to the discipline of study.

Generic Elective (GE): An elective course other than the main discipline of study is called a Generic Elective. It is offered during the, III Trimester/semester for PG programmes.

Non-CGPA Credit Courses (NCCC): These courses are co-curricular and extracurricular activity-based courses.

PG Programme: NCCC credits to be earned by PG students will vary from four to eight credits through Co-Curricular and Extension credits (CEC). The total NCCC credits to be earned by a PG student varies from programme to programme.

Pass Status for a Programme

The student must acquire the total number of credits allotted for the programme for achieving the degree.

6.Result Announcement

All the results (CIA/FA component marks or End Semester Examination or Summative Assessment marks) are published online through the Campus Management Solution (CMS) link provided in the home page of the college website (www.kristujayanti.edu.in). Students are requested to check the college mail daily, frequently visit the college notice boards and website for the public notices and announcements.

Announcement of Term Examination results are published online within ten days after the examination. Other CIA/FA component marks are published at the end of the semester/trimester online through the Campus Management Solution (CMS). Students shall receive the valued Mid Term Examination answer scripts and assignments from the respective course teacher within ten days of the examination or assignment submission.

Results of End Semester/Trimester Examinations are published within 12 days after the last day of examination. There is no provision of improvement for the CIA/FA component marks or End Semester Examination or Summative Assessment marks.

7. Supplementary Examination

Supplementary Examinations are applicable only for the End Semester Examination or the Summative Assessment.

- Odd Semester Courses supplementary examination application can be done only with odd semester End Semester Examination or Summative Assessment.
- Even Semester Courses supplementary examination application can be done only with even semester End Semester Examination or Summative Assessment.

Special Supplementary Examination (applicable only for the graduating batch of students)

Once the results of the final semester/trimester are announced students who are having supplementary shall be allowed to appear for special supplementary examinations where he/she can appear for final year supplementary courses provided the student has passed in all the courses of the previous years of the UG/PG programme. Students who were involved in any sort of malpractice during the UG/PG programmes for the FA/MTE/SA/ESE/ETE examinations are not eligible to apply for Special Supplementary Examinations. Students having shortage of attendance during the semester/trimester of the final year are not eligible to apply for Special Supplementary Examinations

UG graduating batch students who are not eligible for appearing special supplementary examinations of fifth semester are not eligible to appear for special supplementary examinations of sixth semester.

PG graduating batch students who are not eligible for appearing special supplementary examinations of third semester are not eligible to appear for special supplementary examinations of fourth semester.

MBA graduating students who are not eligible for appearing special supplementary examinations of fifth trimester are not eligible to appear for special supplementary examinations of sixth trimester.

8. Revaluation

There is provision to apply for revaluation for the theory courses of UG programme. Student should have secured minimum 15% of marks in the Summative Assessment in order to be eligible to apply for revaluation. Results of revaluation shall be published within 10 days after the application. The best among the original marks and the revaluation marks will be retained as the final marks for the course. There is no provision to apply for revaluation for the practical courses and SEC courses. There is no provision to apply for revaluation for the courses of PG programme.

9. Grievance Redressal

There is a grievance redressal cell which include COE and Asst. COE's. Grievances pertaining to CIA or FA component marks should be addressed to the COE/Asst.COE's through the appropriate mail id (examgrievance@kristujayanti.com) within two days from the announcement of CIA/FA component marks in the Campus Management Solution. Grievances pertaining to End Semester Examination/SA marks should be addressed to the COE/Asst. COE's through the appropriate mail id (examgrievance@kristujayanti.com) within three days from the announcement of the ESE or SA results. Grievances will be addressed within ten days of the request by the COE

10. Maximum Duration for Completing UG/PG Programme

- Under Graduate(Three Year Programme) students are allowed maximum of five years from the date of joining the programme for clearing any backlogs. Under Graduate Students who fail to clear the backlogs within the five years (from the date of joining the programme) should report to the Controller of Examinations at the beginning of the sixth year.
- PG students are allowed maximum of four years from the date of joining the programme for clearing any backlogs. Post Graduate Students who fail to clear the backlogs within the four years (from the date of joining the

programme) should report to the Controller of Examinations at the beginning of the fifth year.

11. Guidelines for earning Non-CGPA(NCCC) Credits through Co-Curricular and Extension Credits (CEC) [PG Programme]

- The components under NCCC vary, based on the programme.PG students have to earn requisite credits as NCCC through Co-Curricular and Extension Credits (CEC).
- The credits earned shall be depicted in the respective Semester/Trimester marks card.
- Students failing to acquire the respective CEC credits assigned for each Semester/Trimester shall have Reappear status depicted in their respective Semester/Trimester Marks Card.
- Students failing to achieve the total CEC credits during their PG programme shall not have 'Pass' status and are not eligible for awarding Post Graduation certificate.

12. SGPA, CGPA and Grading Table

The individual semester/trimester marks card will have the marks, grade, total credits awarded and grade point average details.

- Grade Point: It is a numerical weight allotted to each letter grade on a 10point scale
- Credit Point: It is the product of grade point and number of credits for a course.
- Semester Grade Point Average (SGPA): It is a measure of performance / work done in a semester. It is ratio of total credit points secured by a student in various courses registered in a semester and the total course credits taken during that semester. It is depicted in semester marks card.
- SGPA (Semester Grade Point Average) SGPA = \sum (Grade Point x Credit) / Total No. of Credits
- CGPA (Cumulative Grade Point Average) CGPA = \sum (Si x Ti) / \sum Ti where Si denote the SGPA for the ith semester and Ti denote the Total Credits of the ith semester, (value of i ranges from 1 to 6).

JAYANTIAN CODE OF CONDUCT

Kristu Jayanti College requires all students to act as responsible citizens and members of a higher education academic community. Each student is responsible to know, observe, and abide by the, and adhere to the student code of conduct established by the college, policies, rules, and regulations. Students must comply with all policies applicable to conduct in the classroom as well as in the campus. By means of enforcing this code, the college endeavours to pioneer and administer a student discipline process that is democratic, diligent, effectual and prompt; providing a system that promotes student growth through individual and collective responsibility.

- The medium of communication in the campus is English.
- Students should maintain decorum and discipline at all times, both within and
 outside the campus. Those who are guilty of serious misconduct or whose
 presence is detrimental to the order and discipline on the campus are liable to
 be expelled from the college.
- Kristu Jayanti College is a ragging free campus. Ragging is banned inside and outside the college and in the hostels and any other place of accommodation. There will be zero tolerance to ragging.
- The Anti-Ragging Committee monitors discipline. The details of the Committee members are displayed on the college website and the Notice Board.
- Smoking/chewing tobacco/using intoxicating substances are banned. Such behaviour is punishable. Any violation will be viewed very seriously, and action will be taken against the offender/s.
- Usage of cell phones within the college building is prohibited.
- Students should possess all necessary documents pertaining to their vehicles.
- Students coming in two-wheelers without wearing a helmet will not be permitted to enter the campus. The same will be applicable to the pillion rider.
- Over speeding and flouting traffic rules within and outside the campus are strictly prohibited and are punishable offenses.
- There should be complete silence in the corridors during class hours. Students must not loiter in the corridors during class hours.
- Boys and girls are expected to conduct themselves with dignity and maturity.
 In their inter-relationships, they must observe the norms of decency and propriety.
- The campus must be kept clean at all times. Littering, defacing the walls or furniture, damaging college property etc. are offences. Every class, under the guidance of the class representative, will be responsible for the cleanliness of the room.
- Outsiders are not permitted in the campus. Strict action will be taken against those students who bring outsiders into the campus.

- Students will be permitted to enter the campus only if they possess a valid ID card and every student is required to wear the identity card in the college campus.
- The ID card should be with the authorised student only, and if found with someone else, strict action will be taken both on the owner and recipient.
- If the ID card is lost, it should be informed to the college authorities immediately. Application for the issue of a new ID card will have to be submitted within one day. If the lost ID card is found, it is the responsibility of the student to surrender the lost and found ID card to the college office. Having two ID cards is a punishable offence.
- Any notice to be displayed on the notice boards of the college or classrooms should carry the signature of the college authorities.

Guidelines Regarding Attendance Requirements

- 1. Students having an attendance percentage of 85 and above will be awarded full marks (5 marks) for class participation (marks will be discretely awarded for each course)
- 2. Students should have a minimum of 75% attendance to be eligible to appear for the end-semester/trimester examinations
- 3. Medical Leave will be considered only if a student has a minimum of 60% attendance obtained through physical presence in classes (online / offline)
- 4. The maximum percentage of attendance a student will get for medical leave (with valid proof) is 10% (or maximum up to 7 days)
- 5. Students have to submit the duly signed medical leave/casual leave form within three days of rejoining after the leave. Leave forms submitted after one week will not be accepted.
- 6. Students with an attendance percentage above 60% but less than 75% including the medical leave, will not be eligible to appear for the end-semester exams but may be promoted to the next semester
- 7. Students who have an attendance percentage of less than 60% are not eligible to pay the examination fee. Such students will not be promoted to the next semester and will lose one year. Such students will have to physically repeat the concerned semester in the following year with the following batch syllabus by paying the prescribed fees.
- 8. Students who fail to appear for exams of two consecutive semesters of the end semester examinations will not be eligible for promotion to the next semester.
- 9. Payment of examination fee is mandatory for promotion to the next semester even if the student does not have a minimum percentage of attendance to write the exams (60 74.99%)

Dress Code

Students are expected to conduct themselves in a worthy manner in their attire, demeanour and in their commitment to uphold the value systems of the college.

- The dress code is complete formal on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday for the undergraduate students.
- Boys: Formal shirts, tie, formal trousers and formal shoes
- Girls: Salwar Kameez with Dupatta, Western formals (formal shirt and formal trouser)
- On special occasions Uniform Suit / Complete formal attire
- On Thursday, Friday and Saturday, undergraduate students can wear informal dress (Decent T- shirt, preferably collared and without printed /words /images and jeans) / shirt, trousers, salwar kameez with dupatta.
- For postgraduate programmes the dress code is complete formal for five days in a week. Informal dress code on one day of the week will be decided by the respective department.
- Students should be dressed modestly in conformance to the Department/programme requirements
- Uniform suit is to be worn as per the specification of the respective department
- Low waist, cargo trouser, sleeveless top, transparent, tight or loose attire, any distasteful writings or picture on shirt or T-shirt or sweater are considered inappropriate and are not entertained on campus.
- Body piercing, tattooing and colouring of hair are not allowed.

Attendance and Leave Regulations

- Every student is required to have 85% attendance in every course to be permitted to write the examinations. Attendance is taken separately for each period and is mandatory for the current affairs, club activity sessions or any other curricular or co-curricular sessions.
- Submission of duly filled leave form is compulsory after availing leave. The
 form must be signed by the Parent / Guardian / Hostel Warden. It will be
 verified by the class animator and recommended by the Head of the
 Department.
- Leave application will be accepted only if the actual attendance is above 75% and application for leave of absence may be accepted /rejected by the Principal based on the genuineness.
- If a student is absent for up to three continuous classes for a course, he/she may attend the next class of that course only after obtaining the signature of the class animator in the leave form.
- Due permission must be obtained from the Director, Student Welfare Office/

Dean/Head of the Department/Class Animator before planning to take leave more than three days attend class.

- The attendance and progress report of each student is available in the Campus Management System (TCS iON) and is accessible to the students and parents. The parent has to make a request at the time of admission/beginning of the academic year to avail the facility of viewing attendance status of the ward
- In case of medical leave, the application form should be supported by a medical certificate issued by a registered medical practitioner with doctor's registration number has to be submitted to the attendance section of the Campus Management Solutions, in the ground floor of the Main Block.
- The leave application should be submitted within three days of reporting to college after a leave.
- All leave applications must clearly state the roll number, class, name and subjects taken as well as the names of teachers teaching those subjects.
- Students must be present in the college on the first day of every Semester, and reopening day after holidays.
- Students who are absent for one full semester or more at a stretch without prior permission are liable to have their names removed from the rolls.

Academic Integrity

- Fundamental to the academic work a student does at Kristu Jayanti College, is an expectation that he/she will make choices that reflect integrity and responsible behaviour.
- Honesty is the foundation of good academic work. Whether working on a problem set, lab report, project or paper, students should avoid engaging in plagiarism, unauthorised collaboration, cheating, or facilitating academic dishonesty.
- Students should not copy assignments or copy in exams. Students should not take an exam or complete an assignment for another student. Students must adhere to the highest academic standards in knowledge creation.
- All the works submitted by students for assessment must be original. Students are encouraged to appropriately acknowledge the source of information while referring to someone else's idea.

Fee Regulations

The fees paid by the students will be updated in the college ERP system (TCSiON) within three working days. If it is not reflected, students must immediately approach the fee counter for further clarification. Confirmation of Fee payments is the responsibility of the students.

Issue of Certificate

Provisional Certificate

After successful completion of the course, a provisional certificate will be issued by the college with the approval and signature of the Controller of Examinations.

Degree Certificate

The degree will be awarded by Bengaluru North University. The name of the college will also be mentioned in the degree certificate.

Duplicate Certificate

The duplicate certificate will be issued only for genuine cases, if the original is lost, stolen or damaged. In order to get a duplicate certificate, the following documents should be enclosed:

- Copy of FIR (First Information Report) filed with Police intimating the loss of the certificate
- The copy of the notification published in newspapers or gazettes regarding the loss should be enclosed for verifying the date of issue, name and page number of the newspaper.
- A non-traceable certificate issued by the Police official duly signed by the Inspector or Sub-Inspector with a round seal (from the area in which the candidate lost the certificate)
- Finally, a requisition letter duly signed by the candidate for the application of duplicate certificate mentioning the loss/damage of certificate and the above-mentioned documents is to be addressed to the Principal.
- Transfer Certificate (T.C.)

Transfer Certificate (T.C.) can be collected from the college office by submitting the following original documents.

- 1. Request letter duly signed by student and parent
- 2. No Due certificates from Library and Lab
- 3. College ID card
- 4. Receipt of Fees paid
- 5. Bonafide Certificate

The students, who wish to obtain a bonafide certificate, must apply with a request letter and college ID card.

Migration Certificate

The Migration Certificate will be issued by the Parent University for those students who have taken admission in a college affiliated to a University other than Bengaluru North University

Issue of Transcripts

The examination office issues transcripts for the students who wish to apply for foreign and other universities for higher studies.

- The issue of any certificate or document by the affiliating university is a time bound process and the college will hand over the document to the applicant only after receiving the same from the affiliating university
- Procedure to collect the Original Certificate / Document through an Authorised Person

Students who are unable to come in person to apply for any certificate or collect the certificate due to genuine reasons can authorise a person to apply / collect the document. If an authorised person is assigned to collect the certificate/document on the student's behalf, an authorisation letter specifying the required documents duly signed by the student applicant with the authorised person's details and an ID proof of both the applicant and authorised person should be sent to the college office either by fax (080 68737799) or as a scanned document through e-mailto office@kristujayanti.com. The applicant should intimate the office over telephone (080-68737777) and also inform Vice Principal regarding the authorisation. The authorised person should bring the ID proof (Original & copy) of both authorising and authorised person which is mentioned in the authorisation letter. If the authorised person is a foreign national, he/she should bring the Residential Permit & Passport (Original & copy).
