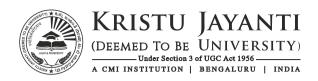

#### **KRISTU JAYANTI (Deemed to be University)**

Kristu Jayanti (Deemed to be) University is an incarnation of the educational dreams of Saint Kuriakose Elias Chavara (1805-1871), founder of the religious congregation, Carmelites of Mary Immaculate (CMI). He envisioned a renewed humanity through the integral development of the mind, body and spirit. The motto of the University, 'Light and Prosperity', aims at this synthesis and the harmony of the spiritual, the physical, the mind and the body. A healthy environment for the acquisition, promotion and dissemination of knowledge is provided with the aspirations of growing into an academic fraternity joining hands for the development and progress of humanity. The curricular and the cocurricular activities are the basic structures acting as springboards to step into the mystery of human life and beyond. The very name, Kristu Jayanti, as the college was established in Anno Domini 1999, is the commemoration of the two millennia of the birth of Jesus Christ, who invites each of us to dream and to reach the perfection of the Heavenly Father, God himself: "Be perfect, therefore, as your heavenly Father is perfect." (Matthew 5:48)

The institution, founded in 1999, is managed by the "BODHI NIKETAN TRUST", formed by the members of St. Joseph Province of the Carmelites of Mary Immaculate (CMI). As a college, it was affiliated to Bangalore University from 1999 to 2017 and with Bengaluru North University from 2017 to June 2025. The institution is recognised by UGC under categories 2(f) & 12 B and was accorded autonomous status in 2013 by the UGC, Government of Karnataka & Bangalore University. The Institution is reaccredited with the highest grade 'A++' with CGPA of 3.78 out of 4 in the third cycle of Assessment and Accreditation by NAAC in 2021.

Kristu Jayanti, a distinguished institution with a legacy of academic excellence and societal commitment, has been conferred the status of Deemed to be University as per the notification dated July 08, 2025, vide Gazette Notification 9-13/2025-U.3(A), by the Department of Higher Education, Ministry of Education, Government of India. This recognition marks a significant milestone in the journey of the Institution, affirming its sustained pursuit of quality, innovation and relevance in higher education.

In the NIRF 2025, the institution has been ranked 34<sup>th</sup> among the top 50 institutions in the country and ranks as one of the top five institutions from Karnataka. In India Today - MDRA Survey 2025, Kristu Jayanti has once again been ranked as the Best Emerging Institution of the Century at the National Level for Commerce, Science, Arts, Mass Communication and MSW. The institution is ranked 4<sup>th</sup> in BCA, 11th in MSW, 18<sup>th</sup> in BBA, 19<sup>th</sup> in B.Com and BA, 23<sup>th</sup> in Mass Communication and 26<sup>th</sup> in Science programmes among institutions in India. Regionally the institution is ranked 2<sup>nd</sup> best for MSW and BCA, 3<sup>rd</sup> best for B.Com, 4<sup>th</sup> best for Arts, Science and Mass Communication and 5<sup>th</sup> best for BBA programmes among the institutions in Bengaluru.

# I. NAAC Accreditation & National Institutional Ranking Framework

Kristu Jayanti College is reaccredited with the highest grade  $A^{++}$  with CGPA of 3.78 out of 4 in the  $3^{rd}$  cycle of Assessment and Accreditation by NAAC in 2021. The college is placed  $34^{th}$  among the top 50 institutions in the country in the NIRF 2025 rankings.

# II. ACBSP Accreditation

The MBA programme of the Institute of Management (IoM), is internationally accredited by the Accreditation Council for Business Schools and Programs (ACBSP), USA. The journey towards international accreditation with ACBSP commenced in the year 2016. Since then, IoM has been on a continuous expedition, exploring and evolving in the quest for quality in its academic endeavour. The indefatigable efforts of the management and staff over the past years have received the best results with the institution achieving international accreditation for 10 years. The IoM has proved its mettle in all major standards and criteria of ACBSP.

# **III. United Nations Academic Impact Hub**

United Nations Academic Impact (UNAI) announced the SDG Hubs on 24<sup>th</sup> October 2018 for their innovative engagement related to the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs). Kristu Jayanti was recognised as United Nations Academic Impact Hub for Sustainable Development, Goal 1. In view of the initiatives taken by the institution as a hub, the recognition was extended for another tenure (2021-2024). Since 2024, the Kristu Jayanti has been honoured as a hub for Sustainable Development Goal 2: 'Zero Hunger'. The institution believes that quality education is a powerful weapon for ensuring a hunger free world.

# IV. Unnat Bharat Abhiyan (UBA)

There are substantial developmental disparities between the rural and urban sectors, such as inequity in health, education, income and basic amenities, as well as employment opportunities. These disparities have resulted in widespread discontent and large-scale migration to urban areas. The imperative need for sustainable development is strictly observed worldwide. It also calls for ecofriendly development in rural areas and the creation of suitable local employment opportunities. Increasing urbanization is neither sustainable nor desirable. Kristu Jayanti (Deemed to be University) has partnered with the government through UBA scheme for rural development. As part of commemorating the Silver Jubilee of Kristu Jayanti (Deemed to be University), 25 villages are adopted with a mission to empower them by 2030.

The prime motive of the UBA committee is to connect with rural clusters, actively participate in the planning process, and to promote the requisite science and technological interventions to improvise and expedite the developmental efforts. UBA is also responsible for developing the competence of its working group by appropriate orientation, training and creation of ethos within the institution that supports indigenous and sustainable rural development. It also initiates the requisite curricular modifications and other facilitating measures.

# V. NPTEL Local Chapter

Kristu Jayanti (Deemed to be University) enjoys the privilege of being a Local Chapter for National Programme on Technology Enhanced Learning (NPTEL) since July 26, 2017. NPTEL- A Project initiative of IIT Madras, supported by the Ministry of Human Resources Development, Government of India, offers an opportunity to enroll for online certification courses in all streams of study. The institution has signed an MoU with CODE (Centre for Outreach and Digital Education) and is a recognized IITM CODE chapter where it coordinates off-campus academics and outreach activities from IIT Madras. This facility enables students and faculty to enrich their knowledge and obtain certifications for courses across domains.

# VI. Consortium of Higher Educational Institutions for Research and Development (CHIRD)

The Consortium of Higher Educational Institutions for Research and Development (CHIRD) is a collaborative initiative among four leading institutions - Kristu Jayanti (Deemed to be Unviersity), Bengaluru, St. Aloysius (Deemed to be University), Mangaluru, Stella Maris College (Autonomous), Chennai and PSGR Krishnammal College for Women, Coimbatore. CHIRD fosters academic and research excellence through joint research projects, academic enrichment programmes, capacity-building initiatives and resource sharing. The consortium provides a dynamic platform for both faculty and students to engage in interdisciplinary learning, collaborative research, skill development and academic exchange across institutions contributing to holistic growth and innovation in higher education.

# VII. Clean and Smart Campus

Kristu Jayanti was awarded the First Prize at National level for Clean and Smart Campus by AICTE & Government of India, and New Code of Education Award for integration of Technology in Learning. The institution has been ranked in the Platinum Band under the Sustainable Institutions of India–Green Rankings 2025 by R. World Institutional Ranking, the only autonomous college to receive this distinction among a list comprising various universities.

#### THE CAMPUS

#### I. INFRASTRUCTURE

The infrastructure of the institution is aligned with the changing needs of the student population. To be on par with the scientific and technological advancements, parallel expansion of infrastructure in the form of laboratories, libraries, skill studios and other learning resources such as computers, eresources and Wi-Fi facilities are initiated. Physical facilities have been expanded to create an ambience conducive to academic excellence and holistic development. Various departments and administrative sections are housed in the Science, Humanities, PG and Administrative Blocks. The university has spacious classrooms, auditoria, laboratories, conference halls, panel rooms, and utility block.

Infrastructural facilities have gradually evolved to accommodate the growing student population. Adequate ICT and technological facilities enable effective transmission of knowledge. The auditoria, Chavara square, turf and quadrangle serve as launch pads for diverse co-curricular activities. Various sports and games facilities contribute to the development of students in extracurricular activities. The dynamism of students is evident in the optimal utilisation of these facilities. Adequate attention is given to provide necessary infrastructural facilities to the differently-abled. The infrastructure has been augmented to suit the growing needs of students and additional funds have been set aside for effective upkeep. The campus along with its Libraries and laboratory facilities are open to the students past the working hours, providing a rich and supportive space for learning. The students can avail the facilities of the campus on all days, from 6.00 a.m. to 8.30 p.m.

#### II. LIBRARY AND INFORMATION CENTRES

Four libraries are located in the Science Block, PG Block, Humanities and Administrative Blocks. The staff and students have access to a wealth of information in books, magazines, journals, encyclopaedia, project reports, dissertations, e-resources, databases and annual reports in these libraries. The library areas are automated and enable easy accessibility and optimum usage through Electronic Public Access Catalogue (EPAC) facility. Separate rooms for group discussions and the cubicles provide a calm ambience for learning.

More than 90,500 books; over 3,000 CDs and DVDs; around 300 national and international journals, 13 newspapers and a vast collection (48,850) of electronic resources are available in the library. The e-database of the library consists of Delnet, EBSCO, Inflibnet, Capitaline, J-gate, Springer, ProQuest as well as institutional membership of National Digital Library (NDL) and British Library. The library utilizes Easylib 6.2, a web version as the automation software, which enables automated check-in and book issue. The annual book exhibition

'Gnanadarshan' is organised to constantly upgrade the collection for the benefit of students and faculty members.

#### **III. LABORATORIES**

#### **Computer Labs**

Computer labs housed in the Science Block, PG Block, Humanities Block and Administrative Block are designed with state-of-the-art technology and the necessary application software for imparting quality education. They are equipped with internet and are kept open beyond office hours to meet students' computing needs. All the computers are networked, controlled by central servers and administered professionally. Computer labs provide IT facilities/services to augment academic ambience of the institution. The lab is equipped with licensed software for academic and administrative needs. The students are also encouraged to use free and open-source software. Research activities are carried out in the Software Development Centre to provide solutions for the institutional needs.

#### Life Science Laboratories

The Department of Life Sciences is equipped with eight teaching laboratories for conducting routine practical sessions for undergraduate and postgraduate students. Fully equipped and spacious laboratories for Biotechnology, Microbiology, Biochemistry, Genetics and Botany have all the facilities required to offer the best practical learning experience to the students. The infrastructure available in the teaching laboratories enable the students to execute experiments and research projects. The research facilities in the department, including the Animal Cell Culture, Plant Tissue Culture, Hydra Culture, Systems Biology and Central Instrumentation facilities support the research, skills training and innovation needs of students and faculty. The laboratories were supported by the DBT STAR College Scheme, to enhance hands on and practical experience for students.

#### **Forensic Science Laboratories**

The Department of Forensic Science is equipped with six advanced laboratories which are well equipped to carry out relevant experiments in Forensic Science courses. With state-of-the-art instruments, the students are trained to carry out forensic analysis and experiments using contemporary methods and equipment. The labs are equipped with Comparison Microscope, Digital Forensic MI scope, Anti-Static Dust Lifter, and Fourier Transform Infrared Spectroscopy (FTIR) for advanced Forensic Analysis.

# **Psychology Laboratories**

Six well-equipped ICT enabled labs, are located in the fifth and sixth floor of the Humanities block that cater to empirical testing. Five individual counselling units and two group counselling labs, replicate the actual experience of group

counselling, enhancing and encouraging the students' understanding of the subject. It provides the students the ability to practice, develop and demonstrate their skills as students of Psychology and equip themselves with competencies required for practice. With the facilities in the labs there is immense potential to generate various studies on attributes such as intelligence, aptitude, personality, memory, perception, neuropsychology and other behavioural dimensions. The use of different tests and batteries help students to extrapolate theory into practice and enables them to have a deeper understanding of varied psychological processes. The cognitive neuroscience assessments, a practical statistical analysis, allows students to address the changing paradigms in the field of neuropsychological assessments and produce viable research outcomes.

# **Electronics Laboratory**

To meet the practical needs of the evolving field of Electronics, well-equipped electronics laboratory facilities in the Science Block facilitate experiments in analogue electronics, digital electronics, advanced communication and microprocessor and microcontroller related experiments. The lab is equipped with DC regulated power supplies, function generators, microprocessor and microcontroller kits, modulation kits, VHDL kits, Verilog and Matlab software. It is also equipped with an advanced oscilloscope to visualise the output waveforms.

# **Physics Laboratory**

The lab is equipped with sophisticated instruments to conduct practical sessions for undergraduate students. The students have hands on experience in using digital instruments like Spectrometer, Cathode Ray Oscilloscope, Polarimeter, Conventional Travelling Microscope, semiconductor laser devices & Ballistic Galvanometer during the practical sessions. The infrastructure available in the Physics lab enable the students to collect and analyse data and provide output to carry out experiments and research.

#### **Media Lab**

The Media Lab at Kristu Jayanti University located in the 5<sup>th</sup> floor of Humanities block, is equipped with state-of-the-art facilities to provide students with hands-on experience using professional-grade equipment. The lab has multimedia workstations for video editing, animation and graphic design. It also has a studio floor for film and television production, equipped with professional lighting rigs and a green screen. Additionally, there is a preview room for reviewing and critiquing productions, a graphics lab specializing in 2D and 3D design, motion graphics, and visual effects, a dubbing unit with professional audio recording and mixing facilities, and a live production suite with cutting-edge tools for multi-camera live broadcasts. A photography studio is dedicated to supporting students in their creative and academic endeavors by providing access to professional photography equipment and space to practice and

develop their skill set. The Media Lab is designed to replicate the real-world production environments, preparing students for successful careers in the media industry. The students pursuing Media Studies programmes gain real-world experience in multi-media productions through the Kristu Jayanti College Television (offline television channel) and Kristu Jayanti Radio.

# Language Lab

The Language Lab located in the first floor of the Science block, provides a platform for students to develop their listening, reading, speaking and writing skills (LSRW). The language sessions complement the thrust of the overall curriculum, which is designed to equip students with practical language skills. The lab uses Orell Talk software, which contains lessons for beginner, average and advanced learners. The topics include language teaching and phonetics, which are difficult to explain without audio- visual apparatus. The students appreciate computer-enabled learning as it enhances their learning and understanding. The lab ensures that students acquire a neutral accent in English which would help them in their career. The Language lab sessions help the students to improve their pronunciation and to gain proficiency in language. The students learn the language through imitation drills, a core language learning method. The language lab also trains the students in acquiring functional language skills in Korean and Indian Languages, which include, Kannada and Hindi.

#### **Business Lab**

The lab offers live example sessions which integrates learning via live examples and offers specimens to provide students with real-world insights and experiences. From analyzing financial statements to understanding market trends, the students engage directly with industry-relevant scenarios. Importance is given to the development of practical skills whereby the students learn by actively engaging in sessions which include practical exercises relating to filling out tax returns and simulating the process of opening bank accounts. These hands-on activities ensure that students have a clear understanding of concepts and gain proficiency in the application of skills. Guidance provided by faculty, industry experts and professionals with interactive sessions designed to meet the demands of modern business challenges enable the students to excel in their area of interest. The industry-relevant training focuses on equipping students with the set skills that employers value most, enhancing their career readiness upon graduation which helps transition from campus to corporate.

#### IV. CENTRE FOR RESEARCH AND DEVELOPMENT

Kristu Jayanti University is a launchpad to pursue scholarly knowledge through research. Its mission is to promote the research environment among students and the teaching fraternity. The Centre for Research and Development is committed to organise best-in-category FDPs/workshops/seminars/

conferences for faculty members, budding researchers and industry professionals. With several ongoing projects, the centre is dedicated to erudite leadership and aim to advance knowledge in the respective fields through scientific discovery, collaborative work, and national and global outreach. The centre is actively dedicated to support the pursuit of excellence in the respective fields.

# V. KRISTU JAYANTI LEARNING MANAGEMENT SYSTEM (KJLMS)

Learning Management System delivers an apt platform in the digital era to facilitate the teaching- learning process. The pedagogy design, instructional design and flipped classroom for course preparation is one of the best practices of the college. KJLMS is the customised version of the world's open-source learning platform. The students and faculty can access this platform anywhere any time using their specific login credentials. It facilitates the blended mode of teaching-learning process by organising and creatively executing the teaching and learning activity.

# VI. WI-FI CAMPUS

The campus area network interconnects campus buildings, recreational spaces, library and cafeteria. The students and faculty members of the institution have direct access to broadband internet services through a Wi-Fi network. Auditoria, seminar halls, conference rooms, class rooms and common areas on the campus are Wi-Fi enabled through the deployment of secured wireless access points with centralised authentication to allow secure network access through laptops and Wi-Fi enabled devices.

# X. KRISTU JAYANTI SOFTWARE DEVELOPMENT CENTRE (KJSDC)

The Software Development Centre was established on January 2024, to facilitate in-house software development for various needs within the institution. The firm developed and deployed the ERP solution KJUsys for the University. #### **XIII. SPORTS FACILITIES**

Kristu Jayanti University is renowned for its excellence and achievements in sports and games. The campus boasts outstanding sports infrastructure and facilities that support and train the students to excel in sports and games at International, National, State and University levels. The **Centre for Physical Education and Fitness** collaborates with many recognized State and National coaches to train students in Basketball, Badminton, Cricket, Football, Karate, Taekwondo, Throwball and Volleyball. The health centre in collaboration with NSS, CSA and Women Empowerment Cell organises health awareness programmes, blood donation camps, diabetes screening camps, general health camps and awareness programmes on women's health. In addition to these measures, first aid amenities are available in every block of the institution and in the separate retiring room for girls and boys. The institution has signed an MoU with Bangalore Baptist Hospital for medical support and care.

#### XV. FITNESS CENTRE

Dedicated to promoting health, wellness, and physical fitness among students, faculty, and staff, the Fitness Centre is located on the 5<sup>th</sup> floor of the PG Block. The fitness centre is equipped with various fitness equipment like Lat pull-down machine, Smith machine with multi exercise options, leg press, leg extension machine, spider row machine, cable crossover & bench press machines, preacher curls bench, cross trainer, treadmills, cycle spinner, battle rope, box plyometric, steppers, barbells, kettlebells, medicine ball, stabiliser ball, hypertension bench and declined abs bench. Students and staff can avail the facility with a nominal membership fee. A full-time fitness trainer is available to guide the fitness regimes of the students and faculty.

#### XVI. STATIONERY AND REPROGRAPHY CENTRE

The reprography centre in the basement of PG Block meets the customised needs of the students and staff. It also offers photocopying and printing facilities for students. Textbooks, laboratory manuals, practical records, notebooks and leave forms are available at this centre.

#### **XVII. MUSIC ROOM**

The music room is situated in the  $8^{th}$  floor of the Admin Block. Students can make use of keyboard, acoustic, electric & bass guitars, drum kit, electronic drum pad and folk percussion instruments available in the music room. The room is used for vocal and instrumental training sessions by the Choir and Kristu Jayanti Music Academy.

#### XVIII. TRAINING HALL

The Training Hall is situated in the sixth floor of the Admin Block. It is a space for performers to learn and rehearse dance and theatrical events. The floor of the hall provides a degree of flexibility to absorb the impact of intensive dance exercises. One side of the wall is covered by floor-to-ceiling mirrors, which aid the performers in understanding their body position and alignment while practicing.

#### XIX. CREATIVE DESIGN ROOM

Located on the third floor of Science Block, the Creative Design Room caters to in-house requirements of graphic designing, web designing, printing and photography. The creative content designing of in-house journals, handbook, calendar, magazines, publications, calendar, posters, brochures, invitations, advertisements and certificates is spearheaded by an expert team. The team also oversees the printing and issue of the Identity Card for the students, faculty members and staff

#### XX. RECREATIONAL SPACES

State-of-the-art infrastructure amidst greenery is the hallmark of the university with varieties of trees, flourishing gardens, fountains, water harvesting facilities, and parks. Three green parks and leisure areas are set up that are replete with lush greenery and shady trees, ideal for students to relax and rejuvenate. In recognition for its concern for environment and sustainability, Kristu Jayanti has received the Green Certification and the Gold Rating by AICTE, Govt. of India, and the Clean and Smart Campus Award.

The Chavara Square provides a platform for open house events such as promotional activities, recitation and performances. The green gallery at the Chavara square is a place to relax in the lap of nature.

# XXI. CAFETERIA AND PANTRY HALL

The cafeterias are the centres of student activities and interactions. These are spacious areas with a variety of hygienic food at an affordable price. It is a popular hub on the campus for refreshments, discussions and student bonding. The cafeteria is open from 8.00 a.m. to 7.00 p.m. Five vendors in the cafeteria of the PG Block, three in the Administrative Block and two in the Humanities Block with modern kitchens, cater to the diverse student community with North Indian, South Indian and Chinese cuisines.

The Pantry Hall is located on the first floor of the Administrative Block. It caters exclusively refreshments and buffet services for the staff and guests of the university.

#### XXII. STATIONARY AND EVENT MANAGEMENT CENTRE

All stationery items and material required for organizing events are stored and issued at the Stationery and Event Management Centre located in the Ground Floor of PG Block. A requisition form has to be submitted at the centre for the issue of items.

# XXIII. PARKING

There is ample space in the basements of the Administrative Block and the Humanities Block for parking of vehicles. The Level I of the basement is exclusively for the two-wheelers and Level II for four-wheelers. Only vehicles displaying the vehicle pass will be permitted to be parked inside the campus.

#### XXIV. UTILITY BLOCK

The utility block is a versatile and essential space created for the functional needs of the students. It houses facilities such as recreational spaces, toilets, bath rooms and dressing rooms.

#### XXV. STUDENT CENTRE

The student centre in the ground floor of Humanities Block functions exclusively for the creative needs of the students. It provides a space for student lead meetings, discussions and talks. Students can use the creative corner in the basement 1 of the Humanities Block for prop creation for theatre productions, literary fests and other events.

# XXVI. ADMISSION OFFICE

The admission office is located in the ground floor of the Humanities Block. It guides and supports prospective students through the application and admission process. The office enables in the scrutiny of student applications, conduct interviews and counselling, understanding the admission requirements and meeting important deadlines.

#### XXVII. STUDENT ACCOMMODATION

Boys and girls have exclusive hostels. The hostels for girls are managed by religious congregations of nuns. As an extended home away from their own homes, the hostels endeavour to facilitate the academic activities as well as the intellectual, physical and psychological growth and development of the students. Moreover, Jayantian code of conduct and decorum are extended to the hostels.

Round Table and debate sessions organized by the Debating Society, enables students to discuss relevant topics of interest. Kristu Jayanti Model United Nations (KJMUN) is an authentic simulation of the UN General Assembly, UN Security Council or other multilateral bodies organised by the Debating Society, which introduces students to the world of diplomacy, negotiation and decision making. At KJMUN, students step into the shoes of ambassadors of countries who are members of the UN, all in the interest of resolving problems that affect the world. The Debating Society organises various training sessions, inter- collegiate MUNs and workshops to nurture the oratory skills of students.

#### 3. Kristu Jayanti Music Academy (KJMA)

Kristu Jayanti Music Academy (KJMA) is a club which consists of skilled singers and musicians of vast culture and traditions. The club organises the celebrated music concert, 'Woodrock', through which students are given a chance to perform and showcase their talents. The academy also hosts the annual National Music Festival 'Euphonia'. Professional training and guidance are provided to students to equip them with basic knowledge of music. Students are trained to master the art of singing, breathing techniques, scales, intervals, modulation, etc. and they perform at various prestigious intercollegiate, intrauniversity and National Music Festivals.

#### 4. Anchors' Association

Workshops and training in mime, skit and drama are held annually. These programmes enable fine-tuning the theatrical and acting skills of students. #### 6. Kristu Jayanti Dance Academy (KJDA)

Various activities and special camps are conducted, focusing on the upliftment of the weaker sections of the society, civic and environmental consciousness. The programmes lay more emphasis on various developmental issues of national importance. In addition, NSS activities instigate social consciousness among students and provide an opportunity to work for the underprivileged and the marginalised sections of our community.

# 9. National Cadet Corps (NCC)

NCC is the single largest uniformed youth organisation in the world which functions to develop qualities of character, leadership, comradeship, courage, discipline, spirit of adventure, secular outlook and ideals of selfless service aimed at the youth of the country. The university has an NCC Army wing under 3KAR (BN) NCC. Students are enrolled for a period of three years. Cadets are trained systematically to take part in the camps and certification exams. The NCC Band of the University has been adjudged as the best band by the Chief Minister at the Independence and Republic Day parade held in Bangalore.

#### 10. Centre for Social Activities (CSA)

The vision of CSA reflects the essence of democratic living and upholds the need for selfless service and consideration for fellow human beings. Jnana Sanskriti has a bouquet of activities such as quiz, essay, story and creative writing, debating, poster presentation, etc. for making learning a fun and enjoyable experience. The students are also encouraged to contribute articles for publications. Opportunities are also created to learn and enhance language skills through certificate courses.

#### 26. Journalism Club

The Journalism Club enhances knowledge and skills in journalism. Towards the end, the club regularly provides myriad opportunities to understand the latest developments in the media, both in content and presentation. The students have the opportunity to participate in activities like reporting, intra-university events, editing, mock press, public communication for social transformation, debates, newsletter publishing, ad campaigns, quiz, etc. Each year, the club conducts workshops, panel discussions and seminars for the students to have hands-on experience. The club also organises summer internships for budding journalists. The club provides a platform for young journalists to contribute to the departmental newsletters and magazines. 'The Quadrangle' (bi-annual newsletter), 'Inkspire' (fortnightly) and 'Zoom' (a developmental magazine) are publications brought out by the club.

# 27. Psychology Club

The Psychology Club aims to explore and impart knowledge, unfold uniqueness, create and develop extrinsic and intrinsic behaviour among students. The students are also sensitised about mental health issues and wellbeing. Screening of movies, book reviews, seminars, paper presentations, games and group activities, fests and exhibitions are some of the informative and pragmatic activities organised under the aegis of the club.

#### 28. Political Science Club

The Political Science Club focuses on the interests and pursuits of students interested in politics. The club organises debates, discussions, forums, quiz programmes, live exhibitions and guest lectures, giving students opportunities to learn about socio- political issues, events and career opportunities. The club arranges gamification, workshops, interaction with bureaucrats (Vidwat Sangosthi), wellness programmes and flashmobs. The club focuses on experiential learning through field visits to the Parliament, village panchayats, the Rashtrapati Bhavan and State Legislative Assembly, thereby enabling students to observe and better understand the working of the political system and functioning of local administration. The unique practices of the club include Mock Election and Mock Parliament that bring awareness among youth and to provide hands-on training. The club brings out an annual publication 'De-Factor' by UG students and 'De-Jure' by PG students.

# 29. Photography Club

The Photography Club at Kristu Jayanti Univeristy is a dynamic community of student photographers and photo enthusiasts. It serves as a nurturing hub for students with deep passion for photography, cultivating creativity and honing their technical skills. The club hosts photography exhibitions, workshops, and guest lectures, aimed at enriching the students' aesthetic sensibilities and sharpening their critical eye in the realm of photography.

#### 30. Film Club

The Film Club organises regular screenings of artistic cinema, documentaries and short films. This forum provides the students with an opportunity to watch, discuss and review films. Moreover, it is a fantastic launch-pad for the student aspirants in the field, exposing them to liberal arts and critical thinking.

# 31. Computer Academy

To keep pace with the rapid changes in the information technology segment, the Computer Academy offers an experience beyond the academic environment. The academy encourages the students of the Department of Computer Science to discuss and update their knowledge through a series of programmes like expert lectures, tech-talk series, special interest group seminars, open badge

digital certification courses, exhibitions, industrial visits, etc. The academy organises various programmes, fests, datathons and hackathons that promote the exchange of ideas among the student community and help foster teamwork and leadership skills.

#### 32. Economics Club

The Economics Club is a forum for interaction on current social and economic issues. It provides avenues for co-curricular and skill development activities for students aspiring to pursue a career in Economics. The club aims to update the students with present economic problems and discuss the current policyrelated issues. The club organises workshops, guest lectures, expert talks and student panel discussions and exhibitions on relevant topics. Activities like budget presentations, online surveys, paper presentations and publications in journals, field surveys, debates and an intra-university fest are organised by the club. The club publishes an annual magazine 'Arthavista', and an e- newsletter 'Equilibria'.

#### 33. Tourism Club

The tourism club aims to make young minds aware of the prospects in the tourism sector. The club focuses on the overall development of the students through academic excellence. To inspire and expose students to diverse perspectives of the tourism industry, the club invites expert speakers to share their experiences and insights. The tourism club organizes guest lectures, expert talks, seminars, cultural exhibitions, field visits, and panel discussions, to equip the students to meet the industry requirements.

#### 34. Professional Interface Forum (PIF)

The Professional Interface Forum (PIF) is envisioned as a gateway between students and the professional world, designed to nurture future-ready graduates. It creates an ecosystem where aspiring learners connect with industry leaders, innovators, and domain experts who share cutting-edge knowledge, real-time industry challenges, and visionary ideas. More than just a platform for interaction, PIF is a space for transformation. Students engage in dialogue with professionals, gaining insights into global business practices, leadership principles, and emerging trends that shape the financial and corporate landscape. Each session inspires them to think critically, act strategically, and innovate fearlessly.

By blending mentorship, networking, and experiential learning, PIF empowers students to chart meaningful career paths and prepares them to excel in professional examinations. Above all, it instills the confidence and competence required to step into the corporate world as responsible, impactful, and future-focused leaders.

#### 35. Investors Club

Investors Club is dedicated to training undergraduate students on the basics of stock market, investment opportunities and development skills. The core ideology of the club is to cultivate the interest of students in finance as an academic subject and also as a career option. The club activities cover a broad range of domains in finance such as investment avenues, trading and settlement. The activities span knowledge sessions, quiz, case analysis, career preparation sessions, mock trading and guest lectures. Experts from BSE, NSE, Mutual Funds, NCDEX and MCX are invited to train students and to create awareness regarding the stock market, commodity market and the functioning of stock trading in Indian exchanges.

#### 36. Forensic Science Club

The Forensic Science Club aims to engage students academically through the department's competitive and joyous activities. Students are introduced to the scientific elements of forensic science through the club, and they also gain from and contribute to the co- curricular components of student life. The club encourages students to participate and compete in the many events and contests while also helping them develop their talents. This aids students in enhancing their expertise and keeping up with advancements in forensic science. A student-centered learning platform 'Forensis' engages students in curricular topics in a non-classroom environment organized by the club every month. The club organizes 'Atrium'- an intra-university UG fest, 'Exactica' - the Intra- departmental PG fest', 'Inquisitor'- a national level intra-departmental fest and 'Kryptos' - a forensic science exhibition. The club publishes, a biannual newsletter 'Veritas' and an annual magazine 'Aequitas'.

#### 37. Speculators' Club

The Speculators' Club of the Department of Professional Accounting and Finance is a premier platform designed to cultivate market intelligence and investment expertise among students. Going beyond the basics of financial literacy, the club immerses members in the dynamic world of stocks, shares, and securities, building a solid foundation in capital market operations, equity research, and wealth creation strategies. Through hands-on learning, students gain exposure to company analysis, valuation techniques, trading mechanisms, and risk-return assessment. Activities such as mock trading, live market simulations, portfolio-building challenges, and analytical case studies enable members to experience real-world market behavior and sharpen their decision-making skills. The club also hosts guest lectures and masterclasses by professionals from leading institutions including BSE, NSE, and mutual fund industries, ensuring students stay connected with current market practices and emerging trends. By blending theory with market realities, the Speculators' Club

equips students to think like investors, act like analysts, and aspire to become leaders in the fields of investment, portfolio management, and financial research.

# 38. Physical Sciences Club

The Club aims to cultivate a dynamic learning environment where students can unlock their potential and explore the captivating world of Physics, Electronics, Mathematics, Statistics and Computer Science. The Physical Sciences Club endeavours to provide a platform that goes beyond conventional classroom learning by organising school visits to inculcate understanding and excitement about science in school children. By organising competitions, exhibitions, expert lectures and skill development activities, the academy fosters an atmosphere of curiosity, discovery, and hands-on engagement, enabling students to develop a profound understanding of scientific principles and their practical applications.

# 39. Sociology Club

The Sociology club is a student run community, which allows for the active engagement and participation of the students in the various events of the department. The club organises panel discussions, documentary screening, workshops, food fest and multiple events that nurture and encourage students' passion towards contemporary issues, society and its complexities and it enhances their critical thinking and communication skills. The events organised by the club include Guest lectures and discussion panels enabling the students to engage in thought-provoking conversations ranging from gender, sociological imagination and global issues. The club significantly contributes in the curation and publication of the department magazine, 'Unlocking Minds'. This multifaceted club propels young minds to discover and pave a path for themselves in the field of sociology through experiential learning.

# 40. Electoral Literacy Club (ELC)

In an effort to encourage student engagement and awareness of elections, the Electoral Literacy Club (ELC) was launched in 2024. Through a variety of events aimed at educating students about their rights and responsibilities as voters, this organization provides a forum for student engagement. A range of interesting events are planned by the ELC, including declamation contests, quizzes, postermaking contests, workshops, especially Voter Registration Campaign, Electors Verification Programme (EVP) and Community Engagement Programmes. These programmes are designed to make electoral rights, educational, engaging and participatory. Involvement in the community engagement activities and a sense of civic duty are fostered by this club. Through its programmes, the Electoral Literacy Club hopes to strengthen India's democratic fabric by equipping students with the information and abilities needed to cast rational ballots.

# 41. Legal Aid Clinic

Legal Aid is key for the delivery of justice to the unreachable, the realization of the objectives of a legal education and the embodiment of social responsibility in the minds of future lawyers. Also, it is compulsory for every law school in India to establish a Legal Aid Clinic under Rule 36 of the Bar Council of India and the NALSA (Legal Services Clinics) Regulations, 2011. These clinics are usually affiliated with District Legal Services Authorities and follow relevant statutory and regulatory mandates (e.g., Legal Services Authorities Act, 1987). The clients of the clinic are the downtrodden and the indigent class who need free legal aid and to be made aware of their rights. Activities involve the conduct of one or more of the following: legal information and education, mediation and conciliation, legal document drafting and referral to professional legal advice.

Student volunteers are exposed to practical legal problems through legal aid camps, prison visits, Lok Adalats and through village, mandal and community surveys. Legal Aid Clinics consist of student volunteers who are mentored by faculty conveners. The experience is designed to help students with a lifelong dedication to public service and legal consciousness that will enhance the Law School curriculum.

#### 42. Moot Court Committee

Moot court is a co-curricular activity in which students participate in role-playing scenarios set in the context of a current legal issue or problem. The mission of the Moot Court Committee is to prepare the budding advocates of tomorrow by training them in legal research and writing, oral advocacy, and the aspects of real-world litigation. The Moot Court Committee promotes a culture of excellence, professionalism and team work in the School of Law. These activities encompass organizing intra-university moot court competition, preparing teams for national and international moots, memorial drafting, trial advocacy, etc. Law students receive organized training on courtroom decorum, writing, citation, and analysis.

#### 43. ADR Committee

The Alternative Dispute Resolution (ADR) Committee works towards encouraging and educating the students on non-litigative ways of dispute resolution in the form of mediation, arbitration, negotiation, and conciliation. As such, the ADR Committee is committed to promoting the use of ADR processes as an effective way of settling disputes and to teaching students the practical skills they will need to engage in dispute processes. intra-university, national and international mediation and negotiation competitions, workshops, expert lectures by professional ADR practitioners and certification programmes. Students are exposed to client counseling, role-play exercises and scenario-based learning, which connect theory to professional skill.

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#### STUDENT WELFARE INITIATIVES AT KRISTU JAYANTI UNIVERSITY

#### I. Student Welfare Office

The student support centre in the ground floor of the Admin Block takes care of fee-related matters, e-mail communication, UUCMS, bus pass, scholarships, etc. The centre also issues Bonafide letters, internship letters, recommendation letters, education loan letters, fee break-up letters and medium of instruction certificate. Attendance related processes are addressed in the Attendance Section, ground floor, Science Block. The Office of the Director of Student Welfare, is in the ground floor of the Science Block. The office offers support for students to overcome hindrances that may come in the path of their learning process. The Student Welfare Office complies with the policies set by the University in order to facilitate a positive academic environment and help students progress smoothly in their educational journey.

## II. Kristu Jayanti Scholarship Scheme (KJSS)

The student community at Kristu Jayanti University belong to diverse backgrounds. In addition to the financial aid from Central or State Governments, the undergraduate students are eligible to apply for institutional scholarships under KJSS. This scheme is instituted by the university to motivate and encourage the students who are outstanding in academics, co-curricular and extracurricular activities and to help the students who are economically disadvantaged and differently abled. A scholarship committee scrutinises the applications based on the criteria and recommends to the institution for the award of the scholarships during the even semester of the academic year. There are four Scholarship Schemes under KJSS:

- a. Jayantian Achievement Scholarship (JAS) for outstanding academic achievements
- b. Jayantian Talent Scholarship (JTS) for outstanding co-curricular achievements
- c. Jayantian Upliftment Scholarship (JUS) for economically disadvantaged students.
- d. Jayantian Determination Scholarship (JDS) for Divyangjan students.

#### III. Student Council

Students have a valuable contribution to make to the effectiveness of their institution. Their involvement in the activities of the university is itself a valuable part of the education process. The Student Council at Kristu Jayanti University is a representative structure through which students can become involved in the affairs of the University, working in partnership with the management and staff. The members of the council are given an opportunity to take the lead in planning and organising major programmes. Through planning, structuring, and executing various academic and co-curricular activities of the university, the

members of the Student Council are inducted into a sense of ownership of the institution. This sense of ownership is disseminated among the student community of the institution. The Student Council comprises of the President (a postgraduate student), Vice President (an undergraduate student), General Secretary, Six Joint Secretaries representing the six schools and members and representatives from every department. The student council members are nominated by the KJU Leadership Council comprising of the Deans, Heads and Coordinators of Departments .

#### **IV. Counselling Centre**

Kristu Jayanti University aims at chiselling the student into men and women who are mature, balanced, and responsible. The university provides the students with the services of professional counsellors. The Centre, with a full-time professional counsellor work towards nurturing the holistic development of all Jayantians. The counselling centre facilitates the development of remedial systems for students whose declining motivational factors may have kept them away from achieving their full potential. The objective of the centre is to provide counselling services in an accessible and student-focused environment, keeping in mind the unique needs of the student community.

#### **Activities:**

- Personal Counselling: Offered in an unconditional, non-judgmental, and confidential manner to students who wish to seek help with personal or academic difficulties. Guidance is also provided for improvement of academic performance by reviewing study techniques and time management practices. The centre also serves as a channel for student grievances. Parents are free to contact the counsellors regarding any concerns they may have about their wards.
- 2. Psycho-Educative Sessions: The centre organises psycho-educative sessions for the students in order to empower young adults with accurate information on various topics of concern, such as addictions, managing relationships, reproductive health and personal safety.

#### V. Anti-Ragging Committee

A conducive and amicable environment is a hallmark of Kristu Jayanti University. This ambience is ensured by various committees and bodies that make students aware of the consequences in the event of breaching the code of conduct. The anti-ragging committee is instituted to ensure the safety and comfort of the students and to provide an amicable environment in the campus and the hostels. The university is guided by the UGC Regulations on curbing the menace of ragging in Higher Educational Institutions. It is expected that every student of the institution reads the below mentioned Government Order and guidelines and abides by the regulations.

Ragging is a cognisable offence and those who indulge in it or encourage it will be handed over to the law as per G.O.Ed 122 URC 96 dated 16.1.97.

#### Meaning of and 'What' Constitutes as Ragging

Ragging constitutes any one or more of the following acts with or without intent to derive sadistic pleasure or establishing power, authority or superiority by any student/s over any fresher or any other student.

- a. Any disorderly conduct whether by words spoken or written or by an act which has the effect of teasing, treating, or handling with rudeness.
- b. Indulging in undisciplined activities which causes or is likely to cause annoyance, hardship or psychological harm or raise fear or apprehension thereof in a fresher or a junior student.
- c. Asking the students to do any act or perform something which such student will not do in the ordinary course and which has the effect of causing or generating a sense of shame or embarrassment so as to adversely affect the physique or psyche of a fresher or a junior student.
- d. Exploiting the services of a fresher or any other student by any student/s for completing one's own academic tasks.
- e. Any act of financial extortion or forceful financial burden put on a fresher or any other student.
- f. Any act of physical abuse including all variants of it such as sexual abuse, assault, stripping, forcing obscene/lewd acts, gestures, causing bodily harm or any other danger to health or person.
- g. Any act or abuse by spoken words, emails, posts, public insults including deriving perverted/sadistic/vicarious pleasure from actively or passively participating in the discomfiture meted out to any fresher or any other student
- h. Any act that affects the mental health and self-confidence of a fresher or any other student.
- i. Any act of physical or mental abuse (including bullying or exclusion) targeted at another student (fresher or otherwise) on the ground of colour, race, religion, caste, ethnicity, gender (including transgender), sexual orientation, appearance, nationality, regional origins, linguistic identity, place of birth, place of residence or economic background.

#### **Consequences of Ragging**

- The University is 'zero tolerant' to ragging. Any form of ragging within the univesity, including the departments, constituent units, and all its premises (academic, residential, sports, kiosks, cafeteria and the like) whether located within the campus or outside and in all means of transportation of students whether public or private will be strictly dealt.
- The University will take strict action against those found indulging in ragging,

including but not limited to, cancellation of admission and/or criminal proceeding against those found guilty of ragging and/or of abetting ragging whether actively or passively or being part of a conspiracy to promote ragging.

• An offence of ragging may be charged either on a written complaint by the affected or on independent finding of the Anti-Ragging Committee.

#### Procedure to register a complaint by the aggrieved

- a. Any student affected by or subjected to ragging must lodge a written complaint in person or by email (from his/her official mail id) to The Chairman, Anti-Ragging Committee within three working days of the incident duly citing the date, time and place of the incident, name and details of the student/s involved and the nature/act of ragging.
- b. Where the aggrieved is not able to present the complaint in person for any justifiable reason, it may be lodged by the parent/quardian.

# VI. Committee for Prevention of Sexual Harassment (POSH)/ Internal Complaints Committee

The Committee for Prevention of Sexual Harassment at Kristu Jayanti (Deemed to be University), aims to ensure a safe environment and congenial atmosphere for the holistic growth of girl students and staff of the university.

#### **Understanding Sexual Violence and Sexual Assault**

Sexual harassment includes unwelcome sexually determined behaviour (whether directly or by implication) such as:

- Verbal or physical threats
- Insulting, abusive, embarrassing, or patronizing behaviour or comments
- Offensive gestures, language, rumours, gossip, or jokes
- Humiliating, intimidating, demeaning and/or persistent criticism, open hostility
- Suggestive comments or body language
- Isolation or exclusion from normal work or study place
- Publishing, circulating, or displaying pornographic, racist, sexually suggestive, or otherwise offensive pictures or other materials
- Unwanted physical contact, ranging from an invasion of personal space to a serious assault

The following is also sexual harassment and is covered by the committee:

- Eve-teasing
- Unsavoury remarks

- Jokes causing or likely to cause awkwardness or embarrassment
- Innuendos and taunts
- Gender-based insults or sexist remarks
- Unwelcomed sexual overtone in any manner such as over the telephone (obnoxious telephone calls) and the like
- Touching or brushing against any part of the body and the like
- Displaying pornographic or other offensive or derogatory pictures, cartoons, pamphlets, or sayings
- Forcible physical touch or molestation
- Physical confinement against one's will and any other act likely to violate one's privacy

The Committee for Prevention of Sexual Harassment assures all the complaints of the students, teaching and non-teaching staff are treated with dignity and respect, and confidentiality will be maintained after the complaint is registered. The aggrieved student/staff may approach the mentor of the POSH or Internal Complaints Committee or mail to internalcomplaintcell@kristujayanti.com

### VII. Grievance Redressal Committee (GRC)

The Grievance Redressal Committee aims to provide a mechanism to students of the university to express their grievances and to redress the same so that they have smooth tenure at the university. As part of its constant endeavour to ensure transparency in all the activities at different stages, the university has devised a mechanism for redressal of student grievances. The members of the cell deal with the grievances, which may be related to the common problems at the institution level, both academic and administrative. The aggrieved student should submit the duly filled complaint form (can be downloaded from the University website) or submit the complaint/suggession written neatly to any member of the Grievance Redressal Committee in a sealed envelope. On receipt of the complaint / grievance, the Committee will endeavour to conduct an enquiry and submit the finding as a report to the Vice Chancellor for further action. In case of false and frivolous complaints (if proved), the Grievance Redressal Committee will recommend to the VC/ disciplinary authority to take appropriate action against the complainant. Complaints dropped in the 'Suggestion Box' by students and parents, and oral complaints will also be redressed. The Grievance Redressal Committee assures that all the complaints are treated with dignity and respect, and confidentiality will be maintained. - To investigate the grievances of the weaker section and provide amicable solutions to their problems
- To safeguard inclusion and effective access to education, health and skill training to all consigned students, along with specialized rehabilitation services for students with disabilities.

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#### **CENTRES**

## I.Kristu Jayanti Internal Quality Assurance Cell (KJIQAC)

The Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) spearheads the quality initiatives of the institution. Benchmarks are set in tune with the goals of higher education in India and the vision and mission of the institution. The academic and administrative processes execute the quality enhancement strategies developed by the cell to create a dynamic and innovative environment in the campus. Institutional and external mechanisms are placed to monitor the thrust for quality. National and international benchmarks serve as fingerposts to develop best and distinctive practices.

#### **Functions:**

#### II. Centre for Research & Development

The **Office of Research Projects, IPR and Technology Transfer** manages both intramural and extramural research funding through systematic grant management systems. The centre operates an in-house Shodh Pravartan Research Grant Scheme providing funds across four categories: Minor Research Projects, UNSDG Projects, IKS, and Collaborative Community Projects. This office oversees project budget administration, establishes Institutional Review Boards

for ethical compliance, and develops comprehensive intellectual property management systems while facilitating technology transfer initiatives and industry partnerships.

The **Office of Research Publications** promotes publication in Scopus/WoS/high impact journals, books, and chapters through comprehensive support systems. It provides end-to-end publication assistance including journal selection, submission support, and scholarly writing while incentivizing high-quality research dissemination through financial aids, recognition programmes, and awards. The office maintains publication tracking systems, manages institutional repositories, and coordinates internal publication platforms and conferences.

This integrated structure promotes interdisciplinary collaboration, ensures regulatory compliance, and maximizes research impact while maintaining the highest standards of academic integrity.

The **Office of Doctoral Research** establishes robust governance frameworks for Ph.D. programmes in compliance with UGC regulations. It focuses on developing comprehensive doctoral research infrastructure, constituting statutory bodies for quality oversight, and establishing research centres within schools. The office maintains a digital portal showcasing research supervisors across disciplines and ensures systematic award of PhD degrees while maintaining academic excellence standards through integrated physical and digital resource management.

#### III. Academic Section

The Academic Section of Kristu Jayanti University acts as a catalyst in the quality journey by implementing and monitoring all the decisions of the Deans' Council and KJU Leadership Council pertaining to teaching and learning process, curriculum consolidation and student support services. - Students who do not have more than sixty percentage of attendance, without considering medical leave, shall not be eligible for promotion to the subsequent semester/trimester.
- Students who do not appear for End Semester/ Trimester Examinations/ Summative Assessment (SA) of two consecutive semesters/trimesters are not eligible for immediate promotion to the subsequent semester/trimester.

 Students who have not applied for End Semester/Trimester/SA Examinations by paying the due examination fee are not eligible to be promoted to the subsequent semester/trimester.

All UG and PG programmes follow a semester system where a semester has ninety working days.

- UG programme Six semesters
- UG Honours Eight Semesters
- UG Honours(Law) Ten Semesters
- PG programme Four Semesters

MBA programme follows a trimester system and has six trimesters. Each trimester will have 60-65 working days.

All courses are assigned credits. A 'credit' is generally a 'value' used to measure a student's workload in terms of learning time required to complete course units, resulting in learning outcomes. The total credits to be earned by a student for Graduation are mentioned in the curriculum.

#### 3. Definitions of Key Words:

- **FA (Formative Assessment):** Continuous Internal Assessment happening throughout the semester/trimester, done through various components like assignment, seminar, activity-based, and so on, according to the nature of the course.
- **SA (Summative Assessment):** The assessment examination held at the end of the semester/trimester covers the entire syllabus of the respective course.
- **MTE (Midterm Examination):** The Internal Assessment Examination, which is held after sixty working days in a semester (after thirty working days in a trimester).
- SCTE (Second Chance Term Examination): The second chance examination of the Midterm Examination is provided for students who missed the Midterm Examination due to sickness or any other valid reasons. It is usually held during the last week of working days in a semester/trimester.
- **Academic Year:** Two consecutive (one odd + one even) semesters constitute one academic year.
- Elective Course: The interdisciplinary Generic Elective course are offered for PG programmes and Discipline Specific Elective course are offered for single major UG programmes
- Course: Commonly referred to, as 'subject' is a component of a programme.
   All courses need not carry the same weightage. The courses should define learning objectives and learning outcomes. A course may be designed to comprise of lectures/ tutorials/laboratory work/ field work/ project work/

- vocational training/viva/ seminars/term papers / assignments / presentations/self-study etc. or a combination of some of these.
- Credit Based Semester System (CBSS): Under the CBSS, the requirement for awarding a degree/diploma/certificate is prescribed in terms of the number of credits to be earned.
- **Credit:** A unit by which the course work is measured. It determines the number of hours of instruction required per week in a semester. One credit is equivalent to one hour of lecture or tutorial or two hours of practical work/field work per week in a semester. In case of internship/project work, one credit equals to three hours. It will be generally equivalent to 15 hours of instruction in a semester.
- **Grade Point:** It is a numerical weight allotted to each letter grade on a 10-point scale.
- **Credit Point:** It is the product of grade point and the number of credits for a course.
- **Letter Grade:** It is an index of the performance of students in a given course. Grades are denoted by the letters O, E, A+, A, B, P, F and AB.
- **Programme:** A programme leads to the award of a Degree, Diploma or Certificate. It denotes the title of the programme (e.g.: Bachelor of Arts, Bachelor of Science, Bachelor of Commerce, Master of Arts, etc.)
- **Semester:** Each semester will consist of over 15 weeks of academic work, equivalent to 90 working days excluding examinations. The odd semester is generally scheduled from June to November, and the even semester from December to May.
- **Trimester:** The Trimester system is followed for the MBA Programme where each Trimester consists of over 10 weeks of academic work, equivalent to 60-65 working days excluding examinations
- Semester/Trimester Grade Point Average (SGPA/TGPA): It is a measure of the performance of work done in a semester/Trimester. It is the ratio of total credit points secured by a student in various courses registered in a semester/Trimester and the total course credits taken during that semester/Trimester. It shall be expressed up to two decimal places.
- **Cumulative Grade Point Average (CGPA):** It is a measure of the cumulative performance of a student over all the semesters of a programme which will be depicted in the consolidated marks card.
- Marks Card or Grade Certificate or Transcript: Based on the grades earned, a grade certificate shall be issued to all the registered bonafide students after every semester. The grade certificate will display the course details (code, title, number of credits, marks, grade secured etc.)

#### 4b. Nature of Course – Post Graduate Programmes (2024 batch)

The courses offered for a PG programme fall under any one of the following categories:

**Core Course:** A course, which should studied compulsorily by a student.

It can be:

- Discipline Specific Core Course (DSCC)
- Discipline Specific Core Practical (DSCL)
- Discipline Specific Core Project (DSCP)
- Discipline Specific Core Internship (DSCI)
- Discipline Specific Core Fieldwork (DSCF)

**Elective Course:** A course, which can be chosen from a range of courses.

It can be:

- Discipline Specific Elective Course (DSEC)
- Discipline Specific Elective Practical (DSEL)
- Discipline Specific Elective Project (DSEP)
- Discipline Specific Elective Internship (DSEI)
- Discipline Specific Elective Fieldwork (DSEF)

These elective courses are chosen generally from a range of courses specific to the discipline of study

**Generic Elective (GE):** An elective course other than the main discipline of study is called a Generic Elective. It is offered during the III Semester / Trimester for PG programmes.

**Non-CGPA Credit Courses (NCCC):** These courses are co-curricular activity-based courses.

**PG Programme:** These courses are co-curricular and extra-curricular activity-based courses. The components under NCCC vary, based on the programme. PG students have to earn requisite credits as NCCC through Co-Curricular and Extension Credits (CEC)

**Skill Enhancement Course (SEC):** SEC is value-based and/or skill-based and aims for providing hands-on training, competencies, skills, etc.

# Assignment / Seminar / Field Visit / Activity Based [Applicable for UG & PG Programmes]

A student has to submit one assignment or have one seminar/field visit per course in a semester/trimester as per the schedule announced in the Examination Calendar. Maximum marks for the assignment/seminar/field visit CIA/FA component depends on the credits allotted and the nature of the course.

## > Class Participation [Applicable for UG Programmes]

Class Participation component marks are based on the students' regularity and active involvement during the classes. A Student having attendance percentage more than 85 is eligible for a maximum of five marks.

- > Record work/ Class work [Applicable for UG & PG Programmes] Record work/class work FA/CIA component marks are awarded for practical courses, and maximum marks awarded depend on the credits allotted and the nature of the course.
- Skill Enhancement Courses: SEC (Value Based) Courses are given due Weightage for CGPA Calculation: The marks secured by the students in the SEC (Value Based) courses were taken into account for the CGPA calculation and for determining the overall status.
- SEC courses are categorized as "Skill Based" and "Value Based" as per the NEP norms.
- The Teaching-Learning methodology involves learner-centered self-phased learning through KJLMS and practical sessions.
- The evaluation of the "Skill Based" and "Value Based" SECs involve Formative Assessment and Summative Assessment components.
- Student active participation in the learning activities provided by KJLMS is taken into account for Formative Assessment marks along with unit-wise online tests.

Students who fail to apply for the End Semester/Trimester Examination or Summative Assessment (by submitting the appropriate form and paying examination fee on the scheduled dates given in the calendar) shall not be allowed to appear for the examination and shall not be promoted to the subsequent Semester/Trimester of the programme.

#### **Malpractice and Consequences**

The Committee for Examination Integrity discusses and gives a verdict on the action to be taken according to the Malpractice Policy of the college.

Students involved in any sort of malpractice (in any of the semesters/trimesters of the programme) will have to face the following consequences:

- Debarred from the Examinations
- Not eligible to apply for Second Chance Term Examinations
- Not eligible for campus placements
- Not eligible to apply for Special Supplementary Examination

### **Pass Status for a Programme**

The student must acquire the total number of credits allotted for the programme to achieve the graduation.

#### 8. Result Announcement

All the results (FA component marks or Summative Assessment marks) shall be published online through the Campus Management Solution (CMS) link provided in the home page of the University website (www.kristujayanti.edu.in). Students shall be asked to check the University mail daily, frequently visit the University website and check the digital notice boards for the notices and announcements.

Term Examination results shall be published online within ten days after the examination. Other FA component marks are published at the end of the semester/trimester online through the Campus Management Solution (CMS). Students shall receive the valued midterm examination answer scripts and assignments from the respective course teacher within ten days of the examination or assignment submission.

Results of Summative Assessment Examinations shall be published within 12 days after the last day of examination. There is no provision for a student to apply for improvement for the FA component marks or Summative Assessment marks

# 9. Supplementary Examination (Applicable for UG 2023 & 2024 Batch) & PG 2024 Batch

Supplementary Examinations are applicable only for the End Semester Examination or the Summative Assessment.

- Application for Supplementary examination of Odd Semester Courses can be done only during the End Semester Examination or Summative Assessment of the next odd semester.
- Application for Supplementary examination of Even Semester Courses can be done only during the End Semester Examination or Summative Assessment of the next even semester.

**Special Supplementary Examination** (applicable only for the graduating batch of students)

Once the results of the final semester/trimester are announced, students who are having backlogs shall be allowed to appear for special supplementary examinations where he/she can appear for final year supplementary courses. This is applicable if the student has passed in all the courses of the previous years of the UG/PG programme. Students who were involved in any sort of malpractice during the UG/PG programmes for the FA/MTE/SA/ESE/ETE examinations will not be eligible to apply for Special Supplementary Examinations. Students having a shortage of attendance during the semester/trimester of the final year are not eligible to apply for Special Supplementary Examinations.

Graduating batch of Undergraduate students who are not eligible to appear for the end semester examinations of fifth semester due to attendance shortage or any such issues are not eligible to appear for special supplementary examinations of sixth semester.

Graduating batch of Postgraduate students who are not eligible for appearing for the end semester examinations of third semester are not eligible to appear for special supplementary examinations of fourth semester.

Graduating students of MBA programme who are not eligible for appearing for the end semester examinations of fifth trimester are not eligible to appear for special supplementary examinations of sixth trimester.

#### Supplementary Examination (Applicable only for 2025 batch UG & PG)

According to the circumstances, different provisions are provided to the students who fail or who were absent during the SA Examinations. They are Immediate Makeover Examination, Special Supplementary Examination and Regular Supplementary Examination.

The Supplementary Examinations for the 2025 batch students are held after the SA Examination of each semester. The eligible students who failed or were absent for the SA Examination of the current semester (for the current semester courses) can apply for the same.

#### **Immediate Makeover Examination**

Students who fail to appear for Summative Assessment Examination representing the University in various events such as (Inter University or national/international competitions, Participation in Republic Day parade camp, national / international camps, student fellowship/student exchange programmes) can get a special permission from ERC to appear for an Immediate Makeover Examination which shall be held immediately after the regular SA Examinations.

Students who appear for Immediate Makeover Examination shall pay regular examination fee as it is applicable for regular students.

#### **Special Supplementary Examination**

The eligible students who were absent or failed during the SA Examination of the current semester can apply for the Special Supplementary Examination immediately after the SA Examinations.

Students who appear for Special Supplementary Examination shall pay Special Supplementary Examination fee.

#### **Regular Supplementary Examination**

Students who are having backlogs in the previous semesters shall apply for the Regular Supplementary Examination during the subsequent odd or even semester as per the guidelines given below:

- Supplementary Examination of Odd Semester Courses can be appeared along with Odd Semesters
- Supplementary Examination of Even Semester Courses can be appeared along with Even Semesters
- For MBA Programmes: supplementary examination of first trimester courses
  can be done along with fourth trimester, that of second trimester courses can be
  done along with fifth trimester, and that of third trimester courses can be done
  along with sixth trimester courses.

#### NOTE:

- Students involved in repeated attempts of malpractice shall not be eligible to apply for the Immediate Makeover Examination or the Special Supplementary Examination.
- UG/PG students who have not passed all the courses within two years of extension after the Programme completion shall be allowed for a one-time sitting chance of supplementary examination after taking due approval from FRC

#### 10. Guidelines for Re- evaluation

There is provision to apply for revaluation for the theory courses of UG programmes. Student should have secured minimum 15% of marks in the Summative Assessment in order to be eligible to apply for revaluation. Results of revaluation shall be published within 10 days after the application. The best among the original marks and the revaluation marks will be retained as the final marks for the course. There is no provision to apply for revaluation for the practical courses, SEC courses (where SA is conducted as OMR based MCQ Examination) and for courses of PG programmes.

Note: 2025 batch PG programmes has a provision to apply for revaluation for the theory courses

#### 11. Examination Grievance Redressal

Grievances pertaining to CIA or FA component marks should be addressed to the COE/ Asst. COE's through the appropriate mail id (examgrievance@ kristujayanti.com) within two days from the announcement of CIA/FA component marks in the Campus Management Solution. Grievances pertaining to End Semester Examination/SA marks should be addressed to the COE/Asst. COE's through the appropriate mail id (examgrievance@kristujayanti.com) within three days from the announcement of the ESE or SA results. Grievances will be addressed within ten days of the request by the COE

#### 12. Maximum Duration for Completing UG/PG Programme

Undergraduate (Three-Year Programme) students shall be allowed a maximum of five years from the date of joining the programme for clearing any backlogs. Undergraduate students who fail to clear the backlogs within the five years (from the date of joining the programme) shall report to the Controller of Examinations at the beginning of the sixth year.

Undergraduate Honours students shall be allowed a maximum of six years from the date of joining the programme for clearing any backlogs. Undergraduate students who fail to clear the backlogs within the six years (from the date of joining the programme) shall report to the Controller of Examinations at the beginning of the seventh year

PG students shall be allowed a maximum of four years from the date of joining the programme for clearing any backlogs. Postgraduate students who fail to clear the backlogs within the four years (from the date of joining the programme) shall report to the Controller of Examinations at the beginning of the fifth year.

Law (Honours) students shall be allowed a maximum of seven years from the date of joining the programme for clearing any backlogs. Undergraduate students who fail to clear the backlogs within the seven years (from the date of joining the programme) shall report to the Controller of Examinations at the beginning of the eighth year

#### 13. Conditions for Receiving Transcripts (Programme Completed Students)

Transcripts are issued upon special request to students who have successfully completed the programme, passed all courses, and earned the required credits for graduation.

#### 14. Eligibility Criteria for Awarding Rank Holders

- Students should have passed all the courses in the first attempt itself
- Ranks are awarded based on the performance of the student in all the semesters/trimesters of the respective programme. The eligible candidate should have earned all the necessary credits [including the Non CGPA Course Credits or Extra Curricular/Extension credits (if any)] as mentioned in the curriculum or programme matrix
- Students involved in any sort of malpractice during the Mid Term Examination/
  Online Term Examination / Formative Assessment Components / Summative
  Assessment Examination / Practical Examination in any of the semesters/
  trimesters of the respective programme are not eligible
- Students who take a break (year out) of academics in between the years of study are not eligible

- Ranks are awarded for those who secured the top most marks (First and Second Position) in the respective Programme among the students within the institution
- Rank Holders will be felicitated during the Graduation Day ceremony

# 15. Eligibility Criteria for Awarding Citation for students with 100% Attendance

- Student should have attended all the classes of all the semesters / Trimesters of the Programme without fail
- Student should have attended all the Club/ Association/ Extension activities of the department and the Current Affairs sessions which would cater to the overall attendance percentage
- Student should have attended all the common programmes of the institution (e.g.: Sports Day, College Day etc.) for which attendance is accounted for.
- Student should not be involved in any disciplinary issues during the period of study in the college
- The 100 % Attendance Prize Holders are felicitated during the Graduation Day

# 16. Guidelines for earning Non-CGPA (NCCC) Credits through Co- Curricular and Extension Credits (CEC) [PG Programme]-(2024-26 batch)

- The components under NCCC vary, based on the programme. PG students have to earn requisite credits as NCCC through Co-Curricular and Extension Credits (CEC).
- The credits earned will be depicted in the respective Semester/Trimester marks card.
- Students failing to acquire the respective CEC credits assigned for each Semester/Trimester will have 'Reappear' status depicted in their respective Semester/Trimester Marks Card.
- Students failing to achieve the total CEC credits during their PG programme will
  not have 'Pass' status and are not eligible for the award of Post-Graduate
  Degree.

### **JAYANTIAN CODE OF CONDUCT**

Kristu Jayanti (Deemed to be University) requires all students to act as responsible citizens and members of a higher education academic community. Each student is responsible to know, observe, and abide by, and adhere to the policies, rules, regulations and student code of conduct established by the university. Students must comply with all policies pertaining to conduct in the classroom as well as in the campus. By means of enforcing this code, the University endeavours to pioneer and administer a student discipline process that is democratic, diligent, effectual and prompt, providing a system that promotes student growth through individual and collective responsibility.

- The medium of communication in the campus is English.
- Students should maintain decorum and discipline at all times, both within and outside the campus. Those who are guilty of serious misconduct or whose presence is detrimental to the order and discipline on the campus are liable to be expelled from the University.
- Kristu Jayanti University is a Ragging Free Campus. Ragging is banned inside
  and outside the campus and in the hostels and any other place of
  accommodation. There will be Zero Tolerance to Ragging.
- The Anti-Ragging Committee monitors discipline. The details of the Committee members are displayed on the University website and the Notice Board.
- Smoking/chewing tobacco/using intoxicating substances are banned. Such behaviour is punishable. Any violation will be viewed very seriously, and action will be taken against the offender/s.
- Students should not involve in any anti social activities.
- Students who are guilty of serious misconduct are liable to be expelled from the roles of the University.
- Indulging in public activities that are of political nature are not encouraged.
- Any form of propaganda through distribution of leaflets/ brochure or any similar material among the students or on social media or displaying any material/information on the University / classroom notice board without the permission of the University authorities will not be entertained.
- Usage of mobile phones and accessories such as ear phones, ear pods, head phones, etc., within the University buildings is prohibited.
- There should be complete silence in the corridors and quadrangle during class hours. Students must not loiter in the corridors during class hours.

- Boys and girls are expected to conduct themselves with dignity and maturity.
   In their inter-relationships, they must follow the norms of decency and propriety.
- Students shall practice and promote dignity of every individual by dealing with peers, faculty members, administrative and support staff with courtesy and respect, with a readiness to lend a helping hand when required.
- Students should demonstrate honesty and sincerity in tests, examinations and other academic evaluations.
- Students should refrain from unethical practices during all academic evaluations.
- Students should aspire for originality in research work, presentations, publications, dissertations, etc., and avoid plagiarism in any form.
- Anyone other than bonafide students, staff and parents, are not permitted in the campus. Strict action will be taken against those students who bring strangers into the campus.
- The campus must be kept clean at all times. Littering, defacing the walls or furniture, damaging property, etc., are offences. Every class, under the guidance of the class representative, will be responsible for the cleanliness of the class room.
- Students should possess all necessary documents pertaining to their vehicles.
- Flouting traffic rules and over speeding within and outside the campus are strictly prohibited and are punishable offenses.
- Students coming in two-wheelers without wearing a helmet (rider/pillion rider) and riding in triples will not be permitted to enter the campus.
- Students will be permitted to enter the campus only if they possess a valid university identity card and every student is required to wear the identity card in the university campus.

#### **Guidelines regarding University ID Card**

- The university ID card should be with the authorised student only, and if found with someone else, strict action will be taken both on the owner and recipient.
- If the ID card is lost, it should be informed to the University authorities immediately.
- A letter of request forwarded by the Student Welfare Officer (at the Student Support Centre) for the issue of a duplicate ID card will have to be submitted

on the same day. The required fee for issue of a duplicate ID card should also be remitted at the Student Support Centre. The duplicate ID card will be issued at the Creative Design Room (III Floor, Science Block) upon producing the receipt of fee paid.

- Having two ID cards is a punishable offence.
- If the lost ID card is found, it is the responsibility of the student to surrender the lost and found ID card to the Student Welfare office of the University.
- If any lost ID card is found by any student, it should be handed over to the Student Welfare Officer / Director, Student Welfare Office.

#### **Attendance and Leave Guidelines**

- Attendance is taken separately for each period and is mandatory for the current affairs, club activity sessions or any other curricular or extended curricular sessions.
- Submission of duly filled leave form is compulsory after availing leave. The
  form must be signed by the Parent / Guardian / Hostel Warden. It will be
  verified by the class animator and recommended by the Head of the
  Department.
- Leave application will be accepted only if the actual attendance is above 75% and application for leave may be accepted /rejected based on the genuineness.
- If a student is absent for up to three continuous classes for a course, he/she can attend the next class of that course only after obtaining permission from the HoD and class animator.
- Due permission must be obtained from the Director, Student Welfare Office/ Dean/Head of the Department before planning to take leave for more than three consecutive days.
- The attendance and progress report of each student is available in the Campus Management System (TCSiON) and is accessible to the students and parents. The parent has to make a request at the time of admission/beginning of the academic year to avail the facility of viewing attendance status of the ward in the CMS (TCS iON).
- In case of medical leave, the application form should be supported by a medical certificate issued by a registered medical practitioner with doctor's registration number and has to be submitted to the attendance section, in the ground floor of the Science Block.
- The leave application should be submitted within three days of reporting to university after a leave.

- All leave applications must clearly state the Reg. number, class, name and programme as well as the names of Faculty members teaching the courses.
- Students must be present in the university on the first day of every semester, and reopening day after holidays.
- Students who are absent for one full semester or more at a stretch are liable to have their names removed from the rolls.

# Attendance Requirements Concerning End Semester / Trimester Examinations and Promotion

- 1. A minimum of 75% attendance is required for a student to be eligible to appear for the end-semester/trimester examinations.
- 2. Medical Leave will be considered only if a student has a minimum of 60% attendance obtained through physical presence in classes.
- 3. The maximum percentage of attendance a student will get for medical leave (with valid proof) is 10% (or maximum up to 7 days)
- 4. Students with an attendance percentage less than 75% including the medical leave, will not be eligible to appear for the end-semester exams but may be promoted to the next semester
- Prior permission from the Vice Chancellor / Pro VC / Dean / Head of the Department / Staff Coordinator of Club or Association is mandatory for a student intending to participate in any institutional programmes or off campus events
- 6. On Official Duty (OOD) Leave for participation in Institutional and off campus programmes will be approved by an authorised official only (VC / Pro VC / Director Student Welfare Office / Dean / Head of the Department / Staff Coordinator of Club or Association). Sanction of OOD will be restricted to a maximum of 10 days in a semester.
- 7. Students have to submit the duly signed medical leave/casual leave /on duty leave form within three days of rejoining after the leave. Leave forms submitted later will not be entertained.
- 8. Payment of examination fee is mandatory for students with 60 74.99% attendance to be promoted to the next semester, although the student does not have the minimum percentage of attendance to appear for the end semester examinations.
- 9. Payment of examination fee is not a guarantee that a student will be allowed to appear for the end semester examination unless he/she satisfies the eligibility to appear for exams (Attendance, Discipline, Code of Conduct)

- 10. Students who have an attendance percentage of less than 60% are not eligible to pay the examination fee. Such students will not be promoted to the next semester and will lose one year. A student has to be physically present to repeat the concerned semester in the following year, with the next batch of students and revised syllabus (if applicable) and by paying the prescribed fees.
- 11.Students who fail to appear for the end semester exams of two consecutive semesters will not be eligible for promotion to the next semester.

#### **Dress Code and Grooming**

Students are expected to conduct themselves in a worthy manner in their attire, demeanour and in their commitment to uphold the value systems of the university.

- The dress code is complete formal on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday for the undergraduate students.
- Boys: Formal shirts (full sleeve), tie, formal trousers and formal shoes (black / brown)
- **Girls:** Complete Western Formals (full sleeve shirt, formal trousers, tie, formal shoes) or Traditional Salwar Suit with shawl/jacket/ sweater or traditional saree with full length blouse
- On special occasions Uniform Suit / Complete formal attire
- On Thursday, Friday and Saturday, undergraduate students can wear decent casual dress (Tee shirt, preferably collared and without printed words /images and jeans) or shirt, trousers, salwar suit.
- For postgraduate programmes the dress code is complete formal for five days in a week. Decent causal dress code, on one day of the week, will be decided by the respective department.
- Students should be dressed modestly in conformance to the Department/programme requirements
- Uniform suit is to be worn as per the specification of the respective department

#### What is Not Permissible (For Girls):

- Skirts (all types), long /short gowns
- Sleeveless shirts, tops, Tee shirts, blouses
- Crop tops / Camisole / Corset

- Track suits / Cargos / Capris / Athleisure clothing
- Tattooing
- Unnatural colouring of hair or streaks
- Shorts / Three-fourth pants/ tights
- Short Kurtis and pants shorter than ankle length (on formal days)
- Piercing of eyebrows

#### What is Not Permissible (For Boys):

- Track suits / Three-fourth pants / cargos / Athleisure clothing
- Sleeveless shirts / Tee shirts
- Tattooing, unnatural colouring of hair, weird hairstyles
- Beard
- Piercing of ears, nose, eyebrows

#### **Academic Integrity**

- Fundamental to the academic work a student does at Kristu Jayanti (Deemed to be University), is an expectation that he/she will make choices that reflect integrity and responsible behaviour.
- Honesty is the foundation of good academic work. Whether working on a
  problem set, lab report, project or paper, students should avoid engaging in
  plagiarism, unauthorised collaboration, cheating, or facilitating academic
  dishonesty.
- All the works submitted by students for assessment must be original. Students are encouraged to appropriately acknowledge the source of information while referring to someone else's idea.
- Students should refrain from relying on AI as it turns academics into imitation, eroding the value of original.
- Students should not copy assignments or copy in exams. Students should not take an exam or complete an assignment for another student. Students must adhere to the highest academic standards in knowledge creation

#### **Fee Regulations**

The fees paid by the students using the ERP system (TCSiON) will be updated in the ERP within three working days. If it is not reflected, students must immediately approach the Student Support Centre, with the valid proof of fee payment. Confirmation of fee payments is the responsibility of the students. The receipt of fee payment should be downloaded from the ERP and kept safe by the student.

#### **ISSUE OF CERTIFICATES**

### **Provisional Degree Certificate**

For student batches under Kristu Jayanti College, Autonomous, after successful completion of the course, a Provisional Certificate will be issued by Kristu Jayanti (Deemed to be University) during the Graduation Day.

#### **Consolidated Marks Card**

After successful completion of the course, a Consolidated Marks Card will be issued by the University. The graduate will be intimated once the marks card is ready.

### **Degree Certificate**

For student batches under Kristu Jayanti College, Autonomous, the Degree Certificate will be awarded by Bengaluru North University. Students have to apply for the Degree Certificate after Bengaluru North University notifies the graduating batch. KJU will forward the application forms to Bengaluru North University. The Degree Certificates will be despatched by Bengaluru North University to KJU. After receiving the certificates from the BNU, the applicants will be intimated by the office of communication, KJU, through an e-mail.

For student batches under Kristu Jayanti University (from 2025 batch onwards), the degree certificate will be issued on the Convocation Day.

### **Transfer Certificate (TC)**

Transfer Certificate (TC) will be issued by KJU along with the Provisional Degree Certificate during the Graduation Day.

For students who have discontinued their studies, the TC can be collected from KJU office by submitting the below mentioned original documents:

- 1. Request letter duly signed by student and parent
- 2. No-Due Certificate from Library and Laboratories (if applicable)
- 3. ID card
- 4. Receipt of fees paid

#### **Conduct Certificate**

The comments on conduct will be mentioned in the Transfer Certificate. If a student wishes to obtain an exclusive conduct certificate, he/she may submit a letter of request at the Student Support Centre. The Conduct Certificate will be issued on the next working day after submission of letter of request.

### **Migration Certificate**

The Migration Certificate will be issued by the University during the Graduation day. Students requiring Migration Certificate from Bengaluru North University should produce the below mentioned documents for verification at KJU and submit the application and verified documents at Bengaluru North University.

- 1. Duly filled application form (Available in the BNU Website / KJU Reception)
- 2. Marks cards of all the semesters (Original and a copy)
- 3. Request letter for the No-Due Certificate
- 4. Passport size photo (1 nos: with white background)

Fee (to be remitted at BNU)

#### **Bonafide Certificate**

Students who wish to obtain a bonafide certificate, must submit a letter of request at the Student Support Centre. The bonafide letter will be issued the next working day after the submission of application.

### **Issue of Transcripts**

The examination office issues transcripts for the students who wish to apply to Foreign Universities for higher studies. The applicant must submit a letter of request to the office of the Controller of Examinations in person or through mail (coe@kristujayanti.com). The issuing authority will notify if any supporting documents are required. The Transcript will be issued within seven working days.

### **Procedure to obtain Duplicate Certificate**

Duplicate certificate (Marks Card / TC / Migration Certificate / Provisional Degree Certificate) will be issued **only for genuine cases**, and **if the original is lost, stolen or damaged**. In order to obtain a duplicate certificate, the below mentioned documents (original and a copy) should be submitted along with the application at the Student Support Centre / Examination Office:

- FIR filed with the Police, intimating the loss of the certificate
- Notification published in newspapers or gazette regarding the loss (for verifying the date of issue, name and page number of the newspaper).
- A 'non-traceable' certificate issued by the Police bearing the signature of the Inspector or Sub-Inspector with round seal (from the area in which the candidate lost the certificate).
- A requisition letter addressed to the VC and duly signed by the candidate for the application of duplicate certificate mentioning the loss/damage of certificate.

Passport size photo (1 nos: with white background)

Fee (to be remitted at the Student Support Centre)

#### Note:

- 1. TC and Migration Certificate will be issued at the Student Support Centre on the next working day after submission of application form and the required documents
- 2. Marks card / Provisional Degree Certificate will be issued by the Examination Office, three days after submission of application form and the required documents

### **Letter for obtaining Education Loan**

Students who need a forwarding letter to apply for an Education Loan, must submit a letter of request mentioning the details of the Bank (Name and Branch) at the Student Support Centre. The letter will be issued the next working day.

# Letter for Internship / Training

The request for issue of Internship / Training should be forwarded to the office by the respective Head of the Department. The letters will be issued from the Student Support Centre on the next working day.

# Letter for obtaining Letter of Recommendation (LoR)

Students in need of Letter of Recommendation should submit a letter of request mentioning the name and department of the faculty member from whom the LoR is sought. The letter should be accompanied by the updated CV. The letter can be submitted in person at the Student Support Centre or through an e-mail (office@kristujayanti.com). The issuing authority may require the proof of claims made in the CV. The LoR will be issued after three working days.

# PROCEDURE TO COLLECT THE ORIGINAL CERTIFICATE / DOCUMENT THROUGH AN AUTHORISED PERSON

Students who are unable to come in person to apply for any certificate / document or collect the certificate / document due to genuine reasons can authorise a person to apply or collect the document. The following procedures must be followed for authorization:

- 1. The student should email a copy of a handwritten, signed authorization letter to office@kristujayanti.com. The letter should include:
- Student's name, registration number, programme details, and contact number
- Authorized person's name, contact number, and ID proof
- 2. The email must also include a scanned copy (with clarity) of the authorized person's ID proof.
- 3. The authorized person must present the original and a copy of the ID proof, along with the duly filled and signed application form and necessary documents at the Student Support Centre for verification.
- 4. If the authorized person is a foreign national, they must bring their Residence Permit (RP) and Passport (original and a copy).
